

A MEMORIAL PICTURE.—Messrs. The U. S. Baptist Anniversaries it appears are to be held at Saratoga Springs, New York. Local News.

The past week has been one of more severe storms than has been known here for several years past. It commenced on Wednesday night and continued all day on Thursday, and on Thursday night became terrific, extending over the whole of the Lower Provinces. The Windsor and Annapolis railway was completely blocked up till Monday. The track from Halifax to Windsor has, however, been kept open—all the trains running on time. This speaks well for the energy of the Manager, Mr. Lynsky.

The intercolonial was greatly interfered with, causing delay in many places by having to dig the snow long distances from the track. About a mile south of DeBert one of the engines stuck in a drift, by which it was completely buried, the snow coming up over the smoke-stack. Here the railway officials got food for the passengers from the farm houses near. At Londonderry one snow plow was completely demolished and another greatly injured, both being thrown upon the track, which delayed the clearing until Sunday morning. The cold was so severe that they had to burn the pieces of the broken plow to keep themselves from freezing. The trains of Friday and Saturday arrived at Truro about 9 o'clock on Sunday morning and in Halifax about noon. A gentleman who travelled on Saturday from Portauque to Truro a distance of 25 miles says that every step of the road was shovelled. The post roads will, of course, be blocked up, and probably all communication stopped for some days.

The streets of the city on Saturday and Sunday reminded one of old times, having piles of snow ten or twelve feet high in many places. Several cases of great danger of being lost in the snow and frozen to death occurred. One boy got off the path on the Common on Thursday night and became so exhausted in his endeavours to proceed that he laid down in the snow, and but for his cap being found by a person on the road he would have perished. He was badly frozen. Several other cases of frozen hands occurred.

A bad accident occurred to a boy on Thursday last. He tied his sled behind a sleigh and soon after his sled upset, but his feet being entangled, he was dragged along some distance on his face before the driver discovered him. His face was badly cut.

The Hon. Peter Smyth, M. L. C., died at Port Hood on the 6th inst., aged 79 years. In his will he bequeathed the sum of \$4000 to St. Francis Xavier College at Antigonish. He also made other liberal bequests to benevolent and religious objects.

On Tuesday of last week a fire was discovered in an unoccupied house in Dartmouth owned by Mr. J. H. Austen. It was rented by Mr. D. G. R. LeCain, who had some furniture in it which had been insured for \$1000. The house was completely destroyed, and its contents burnt up. The firemen did excellent work in preventing it spreading to the neighbouring properties. The Union Protection Company rendered valuable service in the removal of the furniture from the residence of F. Elliott, Esq., next door. The circumstances of the fire were of such a character as to demand investigation. Testimony was taken for several days. It proved of such a character that a younger brother of Mr. LeCain was put under arrest on Saturday and is remanded for a week.

The grandmother of the above died at the age of 105 years.—Bridgetown Monitor.
