

Indians in Mussel Shell Canon, in which eight Indians were killed and several wounded. He lost one friendly Indian killed.

A fire in Anaka, Minn., on the 21st, burned nearly a hundred million feet of lumber, owned by Ferrat & Phines; insured.

At Chicago while Edwin Booth was giving the soliloquy in the last act of Richard 2nd at McVicker's theatre, on Thursday night, a shot was fired in the balcony. Booth sat still until after about three seconds another shot was fired, when he rose and started toward the left wing of the stage, pointing out as he went the assassin, who was at once seized.

A portion of the colliery of the Lehigh company caved in on Tuesday night, and six men and a boy were imprisoned. All the others escaped. Efforts to rescue the men imprisoned in the mine succeeded at 9 o'clock on Monday morning. The relief gang rescued all the men, who were taken out of the mine alive and well, but suffering much from exhaustion and want of food. They were imprisoned over four days. The relief laborers were constantly at work night and day, and finally succeeded in making a channel through fifty feet of block coal. The imprisoned men had built a fire and sustained themselves on the meat of a mule, which was caught with them in the fall. A stream of water running through the mine quenched their thirst.

WEST INDIES.—At St. Thomas trade is paralyzed owing to news of a German import tax on tobacco. The planters are filled with consternation.

SOUTH AFRICA.—A despatch from Glen gleva, South Africa, April 7th, says the relief column reached there on the first instant at four o'clock in the morning. The Zulus appeared skirmishing on the right in front of the Rifles and Naval Brigade on the North east. The Zulus fought bravely, advancing within 30 yards of the entrenchments. The attack lasted an hour, when the Zulus retreated precipitately. On April 3rd the relief column under Lord Chelmsford started for Ekowe. It comprised the 57th and 60th Regiments, six companies of the 91st, Marines, two Rocket companies, one Gatling gun, two nine pounders, mounted infantry and Dunn's scouts. No Zulus were seen. After a march of 15 miles Col. Pearson, with a few companies of the 99th and active seamen, met at five o'clock. The force reached Ekowe at 9.30. The garrison had plenty of food. There were 100 sick.

The Orontes troop ship is ordered to be ready for sea immediately, to take about twelve hundred men for the Cape. A despatch from Pietermaritzburg, reports that the Boers have surrounded Praetoria, and that Cetewayo has fled beyond the Black Umveyo river.

ENGLAND.—Edison's patent for electric light was registered at the London patent office on Wednesday.

In the House of Commons on Thursday Mr. Rylands, moved a resolution censuring increased expenditures of the Government.

Mr. Baxter, seconded the motion and warned the House against the too implicit faith in England's supremacy in arts and commerce. He instanced the enormous advance made by the Americans in inventive arts.

Queen Victoria arrived in Paris on Thursday last.

FRANCE has issued a circular to the Powers recommending them to jointly take up the question of Greek claims for settlement.

The inaction of the Government relative to Blanqui emboldened the radicals and they are now calling upon Davaudier to vacate his seat in the Chamber of Deputies, so as to enable them to elect Henri Rochefort.

ITALY.—It is stated that Garibaldi's subscription for the purchase of 1,000,000 rifles to arm the nation, collapses, through disagreement among its promoters respecting the object in view.

Garibaldi has published a manifesto addressed to the Italian people, enthusiastically congratulating them on the formation of a Democratic League for the attainment of universal suffrage.

SPAIN.—The Opposition number nearly 100 against 60 in the last Cortes. All the Opposition leaders except Moyana have been re-elected.

AUSTRIA.—The hotels in Vienna were crowded on Thursday last in consequence of the Emperor's silver wedding. The concourse exceeded that of exhibition year. The city was grandly decorated. The grand procession in honor of the Emperor's silver wedding took place on Sunday. The Emperor and Empress reviewed the procession, which was witnessed by hundreds of thousands of spectators.

GERMANY.—The Czar of Russia will come to Berlin straight from Livadia, to attend the Emperor William's golden wedding on the 11th of June. He will then proceed to Ems.

RUSSIA.—Sixteen different Universities in Russia have resigned.

Thousands of political prisoners, mostly arrested on suspicion, are being sent from St. Petersburg to goal and penitentiaries of the centre and east of the empire.

The inundation at Moscow and vicinity destroyed thirty-four railway bridges.

At Dunabery the Dwina has risen twenty feet above the ordinary level. At Pensa 500 persons have been rendered homeless by the flood.

German newspapers report that the Tartars of Orsk, fearing forcible baptism burned the town and murdered the officials.

Two thousand persons were arrested at St. Petersburg within a few days.

The *Nwoe Viemra* states that chief object of the Chinese mission has failed.

The Czarewitch has received anonymous letters warning him to go abroad. Murders continue.

The Russian Government find it impossible to secure porters to guard the doors of houses and prevent the posting of placards in St. Petersburg, because the Nihilists threaten with death all who undertake the service.

TURKEY.—The Albanians, 1000 strong, have been driven from the Heights of Marcoff.

Insurrection has broken out at Kasatoria, in Macedonia.

The Russian commanders in Bulgaria and Eastern Roumelia have received stringent orders to enforce stricter discipline among the troops. As a consequence of laxity heretofore in this respect, soldiers propagate revolutionary ideas on returning to Russia.

The Albanians occupied the heights of Samakoff and the redoubts erected by the Turks during the war, and with one and a half battalions successfully withstood an attack of three Servian divisions. There have been three days' severe fighting. The Servians attempt to dislodge the Albanians was unsuccessful. The Servian loss was seven hundred.

GREECE.—The newspapers announce that in consequence of delay of the Porte in carrying into effect the reforms voted by the Cretan Assembly, the Turkish authorities have been defied, and the laws utterly disregarded. Armed men have assembled in various districts, determined to resist the collection of taxes.

EGYPT.—Mr. Oivien, English consul to Egypt, returns immediately to Cairo. A Paris correspondent of the *Telegraph* says he has been informed of the name of French and English war vessels ordered ready for Alexandria at a moment's notice.

England and France have addressed to the Khedive an identical note, which will probably put a new complexion upon affairs.

INDIA.—According to trustworthy information from Cabul, Mahamed Hassan son-in-law of Shere Ali, now the only avowed claimant to Yakoub Khan's throne, is endeavoring to excite an insurrection and has opened negotiations with the English.

SOUTH PACIFIC.—A hurricane visited the Friendly Islands March 6th. The Roman Catholic Chapel, Wesleyan Parsonage, English Consulate, Government warehouse, many business buildings and two-thirds of the dwellings were destroyed. The cocoa nut crop was destroyed.
