Parliamentary.

Dominion House of Commons.

On TUESDAY the House was in Committee on the Census and Statistics. Some slight changes were made, and the bill passed and was reported.

On WEDNESDAY after some other matters had been before the House and questions had been put and answered, Mr. DeCosmos asked for a Committee to enquire into the admission of Chinese into the Dominion by way of California.

On THURSDAY a motion was made and carried for the addition of two judges in British Columbia at a salary of \$4000 each.

A long debate took place on the attempt of Sir A. Smith to induce Hon. Mr. Tilley to remain Governor of New Brunswick another term. Sir Albert challenged Mr. Tilley to prove that a bribe had been offered him.

Nova Scotia Legislature.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

On Tuesday a petition was received from Annapolis Co., praying for legislative interference in the matter of the high rates charged by the Western Counties and W. & A. Railways.

Hon. Prov. Secretary moved that a committee be appointed to draw up an address to the Queen, respecting the abolition of the Legislative Council. The motion passed.

Mr. Holmes then moved a resolution to authorize the Government to borrow a sum not exceeding \$800,000. The resolution passed after brief discussion.

Wednesday was occupied with several matters. 1 City Bills; 2 Money spent in Woodworth vs. Troop, &c.; 3 Moneys overdrawn for Church's maps; 4 Publishing the Counties Incorporation Act; 5 Navigation Securities; 6 The address to the Governor General on the appropriation of the Fisheries Award; and 7 Committee on the general state of the Province.

On Thursday the Address to the Queen on the Legislative Council asking permission to appoint nine additional members, was before the House. In the afternoon His Honor with the usual ceremonies came down to the Council Chamber and after assenting to a number of bills, and in the presence of both branches closed the Legislature with the following speech.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

1. It gives me much pleasure while releasing you from further attendance on your Legislative duties, to be able to offer you my congratulations upon the diligence and ability with which you have applied yourselves to the business of the Session.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

2. I have to thank you for the provision made for the Public Service. In the condition of the finances, the provision is liberal, and it will be my special duty to see that the funds placed at my disposal are economically and judiciously used.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

3. Among the most important acts of the Session is the one passed, introducing the Municipal principle into the government of Counties. This enactment, resulting to some extent, it may be admitted, from the necessities created by the financial condition of the province, is nevertheless a step in advance, and might

well have been adopted had no such necessity existed. Other Provinces have long since abandoned the old system of County organization, as no longer suited to their circumstances, and Nova Scotia cannot afford to be behind her younger sisters in any improvements required in the interests of freedom and progress.

4. The Acts which you have passed connected with Eastern Railway Extension, place that important work on a satisfactory basis, and will, I have no doubt, result in securing for the Province its early completion and efficient working in a manner satisfactory to the people, and calculated to promote and preserve the public interests.

5. The Acts relating to the other provincial railways under construction, passed during the present Session, will, I trust, have the effect of enabling the Province to realize the benefits designed to follow the liberal appropriations of the public moneys made by the Legislature to aid their construction.

6. I had hoped some solution would have been found for the question that has lately agitated the public mind, how far, in view of the diminished sphere of legislative action devolving upon the Province under Confederation, and of the diminished resources at the disposal of the Local Government, it may be necessary to retain a form of Constitution possessing a nominative branch.

7. The proceedings which have taken place of this subject, if they have failed to furnish such solution, have at all events shown that the doubts as to the propriety of the contemplated change entertained in the Chamber itself, do not extend to the Lower House, and that the elective branch of the Legislature, which in a special manner reflects the sentiments of the people, have pronounced their opinion on the question with entire unanimity.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

8. It will be my duty to transmit through the proper channel, to Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, the Address passed by you relating to the Legislative Council.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

9. In view of the present unsatisfactory condition of the Public Accounts, I am glad to observe that you have passed an Address to the Governor General asking for an amelioration of the financial condition of the Province, and I am the same to the Government of Canada.

10. I have been much pleased in giving my assent to the various other measures which have been presented to me, designed to promote improvements, either in the substance or in the administration of the laws.

11. In now retiring to your homes after a session marked by the harmony and mutual courtesy with which your deliberations have been conducted, am sure you will carry with you to the communities in which you reside, and where you enjoy an extensive influence, the same feelings which have distinguished you here, and that you will cultivate and endeavor to diffuse among the people a loyal regard for these institutions under which it is our happiness to live.

Some of our morning papers have a list of the Acts passed by our local Legislature to the number of ninety-one.

The LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL on Tuesday passed the Counties Incorporation Bill.

The attempt of the Assembly to reduce the pay of members of the Council from \$400 to \$300, stoutly resisted and a resolution passed that the remuneration should be the same in both Houses, by the following vote:

For—Cameron, Oakes, Yinnon, McCurdy, Butler, Charles, J. B. Dickie, Cochran, Morley, Tupper, Fraser, Francheville, Boak and Boak—14.

Against—Parker, Donald, Black and Creelman—4.

The bill to amend the Public Charities Act was agreed to, the first clause withdrawing the Board of Insane from the control of the Commissioners. The first clause was rejected by 9 to 8.

The Council proposed to abolish the Queen on the reduction of the Council and members of both of the number so as to effect Assembly and sat in the evening on the 14th.

Various.




