A sad affair occurred on Wednesday last at the Metropolitan Hotel, Barington street. It appears that for two or three weeks Captain Greening the proprietor, and his wife have been on bad terms and that he had more than once threatened to shoot her, for which he was arrested, but he denied having made use of the threat, and after being kept in custody all night was released. He then proceeded to dispose of his furniture and effects, and procured a revolver, and on the day above named, on her refusal to receive him back, fired at her, the bullet striking her in the left breast passed through into the right. He also pointed the pistol at a young woman, niece of Mrs. Greening, who with great presence of mind struck his hand with a scrubbing brush which prevented his firing, one of the boarders then grasped the weapon but was unable to take it from Capt. G. He then walked out of the front door and was passing up Blowers street when he was arrested by a policeman and taken to the station. He was taken before the magistrate on Saturday but remanded for five days. Mrs. Greening's wound proved to be only a flesh wound and after the bullet was extracted will probably heal without further danger.

On Friday last Detective Edwin Butler, of London, G. B., arrived here having in custody a young man named Thos. R. Shelton, charged with embezzling about £60 from the English Post Office Savings Bank, in which he was a clerk, last November. Shelton came from England to Canada. He was followed, and found working on a farm near Toronto. He was taken back to England in the mail steamer.

The City Council propose not to make any appointment of Health Inspectors vacant by the death of Messrs. Shean and Spike. The work is to be done in future by the Deputy Marshal and sergeants of the police.

The Steamer Naples came into our harbor on Friday evening last having in tow the barque Ada Barton of St. John, N. B., dismasted and abandoned. She was fallen in with about 350 miles from this port. The Naples had a cargo of grain, meat in refrigerators, and 165 head of live cattle. She left her prize here and went on her way on Saturday afternoon.

At Oxford, a young man named Daniel Ross, of Victoria, was missed on Saturday last. His friends turned out on Friday to search the country for him, and found his lifeless body suspended to a tree in the woods, a mile from home. No reason has been assigned for his taking his life.

A 40 pound salmon is reported caught at Digby last week.

The Steamer Newfield returned from a visit to Sable Island on Wednesday last. She brought up a number of passengers, including Capt. J. F. Corning and crew of the Yarmouth barque Oriental, wrecked on the Island.

The barque left Philadelphia, March 19th, for Cork, with a cargo of 63,700 bushels of corn. On the 31st the vessel struck on the South East bar of Sable Island. The vessel soon went to pieces and the cargo was all lost. The Oriental was a vessel of 1056 tons register, built at Quebec last year, whence she hailed, valued at \$45,000, and was owned by Messrs. S. J. & A. M. Hatfield, of Yarmouth.

An intoxicated man laid down to sleep on Hart's wharf Thursday afternoon; when he awoke, thinking he was in bed, he gently put his foot over the side and went overboard. He was rescued by some men in a schooner.—Herald.

Dartmouth was yesterday passing through the excitement of its sixth civic election. The nominations made last week were:

The homestead of Mr. Silvanus Morton, at Milton, Queen's, was destroyed by fire on Wednesday night last. It was unoccupied. Incendiarism supposed.

The Granville Street Sabbath School gave a literary and musical entertainment at the Spring Garden Vestry on Monday evening. Although the weather was very unfavorable there was a good company present, and the exercises were well sustained by the young people. It was a pleasant occasion.

Mr. Andrew Barton of Tangier brought to town 146 ounces of gold valued at \$3,000, taken from 80 tons of quartz. Since the beginning of the year Mr. Barton has mined 371 ounces of gold.
