Our brethren in the Upper Provinces are proposing a scheme for consolidating the two Conventions through which they have bitherto been working. They have now the Convention East comprising the churches, in the province of Quebec, and the Convention West, embracing the churches in Ontario, and more or less those farther west. The scheme now proposed is as follows :---"Our Home Mission Conventions, East and West, to continue to oversee their work on their respective fields. In order, however, to unite the two Provinces and bring their general work under the control of a single representive body, a Baptist Union of Ontario and Quebec is proposed. This Union is to have power to appoint all the Executive Boards of the various Societies: those of Home Missions, East and West, being nominated at their respective Conventions. All these Boards are to be answerable to the Union, and present a joint report each year to the Union, through its secretary, for discussion, adoption or rejection.' 


