Mr. S. C. Hewson, of Amherst, is concluding this week, the shipment of his winter's purchase of Furs which have come from New Brunswick, Eastern Nova Scotia, and in a limited number from Quebec.

On Thursday a man named McNeil, belonging to Glasgow, G. B., while intoxicated, stumbled and fell heavily, breaking one of his legs.

The first arrival from the seal fisheries at St. John's has been announced. The Proteus, belonging to J. & W. Stewart, with only 11,000 seals, which considering the depressed state of the oil market in England, is a miserable trip.

At Town Gut, Pictou County, on Tuesday of last week. A little boy between six and seven years of age wandered away from town in search of a dog. Search was made for him but fruitlessly, all Tuesday evening and night.

There have been large shipments of cattle at Richmond for England during the past week. For the last four months, there have been 4000 head in the hands of one firm in Ontario waiting the result of this shipment via the Intercolonial Railway.

The Y. M. C. Association closed its season of public entertainments on Tuesday evening last week by an evening of music and reading.

The Young Folks of the North Baptist congregation gave a pleasing entertainment on Thursday evening which was well attended and quite a success.

On Saturday last two boys one of 13 years named William Wier and Charles Stirling of 12 years were arrested, charged with having committed several burglaries—one in Clarke's auction rooms on the 11th of March and the Herald office on the 15th and on Friday last Smithers Locksmith. At Stirlings house under the steps of the front door enclosed in a leather sheath were found two jimmies and a screw-driver.

George Paw the Postal clerk was fully committed for trial at the April term of the Supreme Court on the charge of robbing the mails.

The South Baptist Institute gave a literary and musical entertainment on Monday evening, at the Spring Garden Vestry. The night was quite stormy, and yet the Hall was crowded.

At Dartmouth on Saturday last some men were digging out a cellar and found a skull which some thought was that of Dr. McDonald, who disappeared very mysteriously about 32 years ago from the same house, in which he was at the time a boarder.

A Branch Railway into Dartmouth is before the people of that enterprising town. The distance from the Grand Lake or Junction Stations would be not more than about half of that to Richmond Station. Such a road might be made to greatly relieve the road into the city. An enthusiastic meeting was held in reference thereto on Monday evening.

A Duke Aosta, brother of the King of Italy, left Rome for Baveno, on lake Maggiore, to welcome the Queen.

The Commons will adjourn from the 8th of April to the 17th—the Easter recess.

In the House of Lords, the Marquis of Lansdowne moved a resolution of censure that an ultimatum calculated to produce immediate war should have been presented to the Zulu king without authority from the responsible advisers of the crown.

Lord Cranbrook said the annexation of Transvaal far from precipitating the war, to which the natives had been incited by their successes over the Dutch, had undoubtedly postponed it.

The proposal to reduce the salaries of town officials is withdrawn.

ENGLAND.—Her Majesty Queen Victoria embarked at Portsmouth on Tuesday morning on board the Royal Yacht Victoria and Albert for Cherbourg en route for Italy, where she intends to spend some weeks in quiet seclusion.

Her travelling party consists of Princes Beatrice, a Lady and a Maid of Honor, General Ponsonby, Captain Edwards, and Dr. Jenner, besides a number of servants.

Upon arriving at Cherbourg the Queen took a special train provided for her by order of the French Government, made up of her own saloon carriages, which had been forwarded in advance.

On Thursday at Paris President Grevy, Minister Waddington and ex-President MacMahon paid visits to Queen Victoria, who afterwards started for Italy, by way of Caen, Tours and Mount Cenit Tunnel.

The King of Italy placed the Royal train of the Alta Italian Line at Her Majesty's disposal, and ordered the royal carriages at Manza to be in waiting for her at Arona, but the Queen declined these, and preferred to make the whole journey in her own carriages.

Prince Waldeman, third son of Prince Frederick William and grandson of Queen Victoria, died suddenly of heart disease on Wednesday last.

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Lords Stanley and Kimberley and the Duke of Somerset attacked Frere and advised his recall. Lord Beaconsfield stated that Frere had been placed in office principally to carry out the policy of Confederation, such as had been successful in Canada.

FRANCE.—One hundred Communists were annetted on Tuesday last. It is calculated that the Senate will reject the proposal for a meeting of chambers in Congress to consider the question of removal from Versailles to Paris.

RUSSIA.—100 arrests have been made in Moscow in consequence of the assassination of a Government spy. It is stated that after the Czar has started for Livadia the Government intends to proclaim a state of siege in St. Petersburg, Moscow, Kieff and Charkoff.

TURKEY.—7,000 men insured in Macedonia. 18,000 Roumelian refugees are about entering Bulgaria, and many thousand more are expected.

PERSIA.—The Times reports shocks of earthquake in Northern Persia on Saturday and Sunday.

INDIA.—A Tashkend despatch reports that General Kauffmann declares that Russia has decided to abandon Afghanistan totally to England.

A despatch from Akyab, Farther India, reports that a recent fire accidentally destroyed the native portion of the town. Loss \$500,000. Thousands of people are homeless.

Miscellaneous.

The Pall Mall Gazette says: "A private letter from a high Indian official states that the people of Cashmere are dying of famine like flies, and at the present rate of mortality the Province will be nearly depopulated by the end of the year."
