UNADULTERATED FOOD.

The Boston Watchman in thinking over this matter indulges in the exclamation :

Happy subjects of Queen Victoria ! Thanks to adequate inspection laws fearlessly enforced, the frauds and perils of adulteration are no more; or they may, at least be shunned by those who will- Every article of consumption is supplied to the market in a pure and wholesome state, and the purchaser may feel a reasonable certainty that what he receives is what he asked for. Dr. Hassall, in a letter to the London Times, says that "the public can now procure bread without alum ; coffee without roasted wheat, beans, or even chicory cocoa without fecula; bottled fruits, vegetables, and pickles without copper; potted meat wrthout bole Armenian mustard without wheat flour and tumeric cayenne without red lead ; vinegar without sulphuric acid; but milk still, unfortunately, often not without water."
