

Mr. J. W. FREEMAN of Milton, Queens, is growing a bush bean, some of the stocks of which have 125 pods—an average of 100 pods to the stalk.

QUEBENS COUNTY is rejoicing over its gold and silver mines, the former about 15 miles from Milton and the latter near Mill Village.

REV. JOHN CAMERON has accepted a unanimous call to the Presbyterian Church in Bridgewater. He was presented with a purse of \$93 before leaving Nine mile River.

Heavy Thunder Storms visited the eastern parts of the Province during last week. At Londonderry and Pictou it was specially severe, rain and hail of extraordinary size fell. The crops have been seriously damaged.

At Guysboro the lightning entered the Dominion Telegraph Office by the wire and set the building on fire. A person near by observed smoke issuing from the building, and, bursting open the door, succeeded in extinguishing the fire and saving the building. The instruments are considerably damaged. Sixteen telegraph poles, within one and a half miles from Torbay, are more or less demolished. The splinters are scattered in all directions.

At Hanceford, near Oxford, early on Tuesday morning, Isaac Matheson's house was discovered to be on fire. It is supposed that the lightning ignited the building. There were three men in the house and a puncheon of rain water at the door, and by great exertion the fire was extinguished. Damage considerable.

At Economy the house of a Mr. Austen was struck by lightning, and he and his wife severely injured, the latter, it is feared, fatally.
