The international congress to discuss the project for a ship canal across the Isthmus of Panama met in Paris. Ferdinand De Lesseps was elected President, and Rear Admiral Daniel Ammen, United States navy, one of the Vice-Presidents. All the powers applied to sent delegates, including England, Italy and Russia. The Secretary read a paper on the subject before the congress.

La Liberte announces that, in consequence of the efforts of President Grevy, the Cabinet has resolved to leave all disturbing questions in abeyance.

Le Temps makes a confirmatory statement that the difficulties have been arranged. When the questions of the return of the Chambers to Paris comes up the Cabinet will point to its past conduct as a sufficient guarantee of tranquility and, if necessary, demand a vote of confidence.

SPAIN.—The marriage of King Alfonso will take place in October. Communal elections throughout Spain

are largely in favor of the Government. GERMANY .- A bill relating to Alsace and Lorraine provides that the Emperor appoint a studtholder, who will act as a representative of the Imperial Government and reside at Strasburg. The office of President to be abolished. A ministry, with Secretary of State, to be formed at Strasburg and a council of State, to be established. The studtholder to be President of the Council. The Provincial committee will number 58. Delegates elected by the Provincial committee, subject to the approval of the Emperor, will represent Alsace and Loraine in the Federal Council.

Princess Charlotte, of Prussia, wife of Prince Bernhard, Saxe Meinigen, and granddaughter of Queen Victoria was delivered of a daughter on Monday the 12th inst.

The Alsace Lorraine bill is generally satisfactory to Liberals in the Reichstag and Home Rulers in the annexed provinces. General Von Manteuffel is to be Vicerov.

ITALY.—At a consistory held at Rome last week the Pope appointed five Cardinal Priests and three Cardinal Dea cons. Among the new Cardinals are Rev. John Henry Newman, of England, and Rev. Dr. Herzenroether. The Pope made numerous appointments to bishoprics, and among those of Cardinal Hohenlohe to the Bishopric of Albano, Rev. Dr. McCabe to that of Dublin, and Rev. Dr. Woodlock to that of of Ardagh and Clowmacnois.

Rev. Dr. Newman, replying to consistorial messenger announcing his elevation to a Cardinalate, made a long speech, the gist of which was that he would resist with all his powers the spirit of liberalism in religion, the doctrine that there is no positive truth in religion, and that one creed is as good as another.

Vesuvius has been agitated for some days but the eruption is slight. Garibaldi has decided to reside permanently in Rome.

Russia.-It is stated that the Luldja question is still unsettled, and the Chinese are cocentrating on the frontier.

Since the attempt upon the life of the Emperor, every one coming into Russia must be provided with a passport, duly verified by the Russian Consul. All the principal ministers are now accompanied by mounted Cossacks when they appear in public.

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on the 13th that there was another fire there on the 8th inst., which was quickly extinguished. A fire also broke out on the 12th in the Cossack quarter, which was half consumed. The Governor of Uralsk, in the government of Orenburg, telegraphed on the 11th that a fire destroyed a considerable portion of the town and was still raging.

Several conflagrations in east Russian towns are causing great distress. Several arrests were made in Orenburg on charges of incendiarism. Four male and six female prisoners are undergoing court martial at Kieff, including three noblemen. Another is a Prussian subject, and the daughter of a Privy Councillor. Among other arrests are a titled lady and a leading Nihilist. The streets of Kieff, near the Court house will be closed during the trial.

There was another fire in Isbit on the 13th when four of the poorer quarters were destroyed.

It is stated that the Russian Steam Navigation Co. will convey 40,000 men and 2,600 horses from Bourgas between May 15 and June 15, and the remainder of the evacuating army will go by rail. Way via Reni.

The Czar has decreed that prisoners aged 50 years.

The Gazette reports the losses by the conflagration at Irbit as enormous. The Treasury, Post Office and Town Hall are saved. The fire raged all Saturday and Sunday.

A Berlin despatch points out that Irbit is largely used as a place of exile. Intelligence received from Tiflis states that a disease with terrible mortality has broken out in ten districts in Caucasus. A solemn procession, with holy pictures, has been held in districts of Jovi, and prayers offered for the preservation of the inhabitants.

The greater part of Lublin, a city of 20,000 inhabitants in Russian Poland, has been burned.

TURKEY.—There has been a disorderly manifestation on the part of the officials in the War Office in consequence of their pay being in arrears.

The Porte has renounced the occupation of Ichtonian, but persists in occupying Bourgas.

India.—There was a great conflagration on Tuesday night at Poonah, an important Government and military centre. Government School, Boodwar Palace, Law Courts, Post Office, Police Office, and 50 houses were destroyed.

The Government offered for subscription a loan of £5,000,000 at 41 per cent, interest. Nine-tenths of the loan was taken at 94, principally by Indian bank-
