PROVINCIAL APPOINTMENTS.—Kings Co.—To be Justices of the Peace: Joseph Benson Bower, Grand Pre; Edward McLatchy, Grand Pre.

Yarmouth Co.—To be Justice of the Peace: J. W. H. Rowley, Yarmouth.

Sheburne Co.—To be Justice of the Peace: Alfred K. Smith, Cape Island.

Halifax Co.—To be a Deputy Surveyor of Crown Lands: Angus Cruikshanks, Sheet Harbor.

There are in connection with the Halifax and Dartmouth Sabbath School Association 28 schools, 529 officers and teachers, and 4,330 scholars. Only Methodist, Baptist and Presbyterian schools affiliate with the Association.

The weather during the past month has been highly favorable for securing the crops in good order.

A plasterer named Rooney, who must have been a little astray, jumped from Wood's wharf in the harbor one day last week, proposing to catch the steamer for New York. He said he was bound to catch her. He had drifted down the harbor a considerable distance when a man named Fleming, a spar maker, employed on the wharf, rescued him in a boat.

Use Auriline for earache. The body of Mr. Stitt McClelland was found on Friday floating under Messrs. Wood & Co.'s wharf. He had been missing ever since Saturday the 11th inst. He was formerly doing a large commission business in Halifax. An inquest was held and a verdict of Accidental Death given.

The Anglo American Cable Company announce that they will reduce the tariff on messages to six pence per word, from the date of opening the new French cable for traffic.

On Wednesday last there was a review of Militia and Regular troops on the Common. The former were about 600 strong and about the same number of the latter were present, and they in company went through a variety of manoeuvres and a sham fight. There were probably about 2000 spectators.

A Boston paper of Wednesday says: "John Lang, of Halifax, N.S., while intoxicated yesterday, fell through the River Street railroad bridge in Dedham and fractured a hip."

A large quantity of new imported fruit—about 1300 boxes and other packages—were sold by auction last week and obtained good prices, raisins was sold from \$2.60 per box.

Chalmers Church has made its annual financial exhibit. The Sunday collections average \$51.93 per week. The missionary contributions amount to \$780.27 for the year.

The brig Como, Capt. Tooker, chartered by the Carville Line, cleared the other day for London, taking 1,033 barrels of apples, 932 barrels of potatoes, 3,865 cases of preserved fish, and other produce, making a total value of \$28,000.

Mr. Hugh Greene, of Dartmouth, father of Mr. W. H. Greene, was missing since Saturday the 18th inst. A large number of persons were searching for him for days. He was afterwards found with his friends at Stewiacke.

The schr. E. Abro, owned by C. B. Whidden, is reported a total wreck on Cape Broyle, Nfld. Crew saved. The vessel was partly insured in the Ocean. She was returning from St. John's. No cargo.

YARMOUTH is to have a steamer plying between that town and the West Indies. The Alpha is the first of what is to be known as the "Clements line."

One million feet of lumber have been shipped from Kingston Station, Kings County, to the West Indies during this season.

A schooner supposed to be of about 60 tons, was discovered on Tuesday last near Carriboo Island lighthouse, bottom upwards. The bodies of two men, one about 60 years of age, and the other about 30, and another, a boy, were washed ashore on the island.

A large quantity of bark, and about 10 pieces of pine boards had drifted ashore. The schooner lies so deeply imbedded in the sand that no name can be seen. It is supposed the schooner was struck by a squall on Sunday evening.
