The Edgar Stuart on her passage hence to the westward last week, was on her way from Lunenburg to Liverpool about 11 past eleven on Wednesday night, and a white light appeared, which was supposed to be a vessel at anchor. Having no time to avoid a collision, although the engines were reversed she struck the shallow midships which sunk immediately. Three men were on board, William Smith, John Swartz, and Nathaniel Smith. The latter a married man was drowned. Boats were lowered in four minutes and remained some time searching for him but they were obliged to give him up as lost.

Two men, named Peter Brown and Nelson Peterson, belonging to the American fishing schooner *Frederick Geering jr.*, of Gloucester, Mass., came to Halifax in the steamer *George Shattuck* on Wednesday from St. Pierre, Miq. They were attending their trawls in a dory on St. Pierre Banks and missed their vessel in the fog. After being four days in their boat, without food or water, they were picked up by the French schr. *Clemance* and landed at St. Pierre, on Saturday last.

Mr. John C. Spencer, the I. C. R. Station agent at Londonderry, had the bones of one of his ankles fractured last Sunday morning by jumping suddenly out of a waggon to take a restless horse by the head.

Mr. Howard Brundige had two fingers and a thumb very severely cut by the circular saw in a saw mill at Tidnish recently. The third finger had to be amputated at the second joint.
