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THE HOUSEHOLD.

BOILED HAM.—Cut in thin slices, and place in cold water to soak overnight. In the morning turn off the water, put into a sauce-pan and pour over boiling water.

Home-made vinegar; One gallon molasses, ten gallons rain water, half a pint of good yeast. This will be good vinegar in three or four weeks.

BLEACHING A STRAW HAT.—(1) If your hat is badly sun-burned soak it in sour milk a few days. (2) Wash your hat clean in lively soap-suds with either a flesh or a tooth-brush, then rinse. Have a tight barrel or box ready.

HEALTH HINTS.

I have seen salt recommended to be eaten with walnuts, so as to prevent indigestion, but I think I prefer eating the walnut without any such condiment.

CURE FOR CANCER.—A Mexican colonel tested a remedy for cancer, recommended to him by a Spanish woman, a native of the country. The remedy is this:—Take an egg and break it, pour out the white, retaining the yolk in the shell, put in salt and mix with the yolk as it will receive it, stir them together until the salve is formed; put a portion of this on a piece of sticking plaster, and apply it to the cancer about twice a day.

A never-failing remedy for ague in the breast, is to wear a very small bag filled with alum. It must be worn continually while nursing a child. A neighbor has practiced it for the period of twenty years, and in now nursing the sixth child.

Rub sprains, bruises or lameness, with a paste made of salt and the white of an egg. For burns, bind on moistened baking soda. It will give prompt and permanent relief.

AGRICULTURE.

BEES.—One of the most modern inventions, and one which causes a complete revolution in bee-culture, consists in artificial combs or what the Americans call foundation. It consists of a thin sheet of wax on which are deeply stamped the exact form of the cells in the comb.

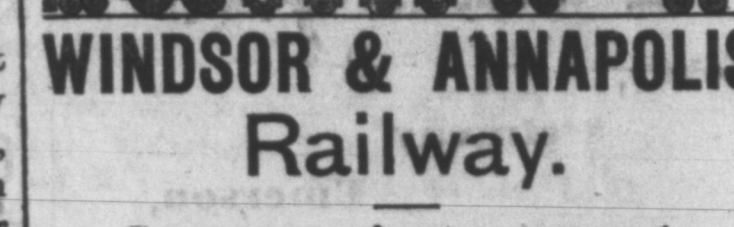
