FROM MRS. CHURCHILL TO THE SECRETARY OF THE N. S. CENTRAL

BOBBILLY, June 12, 1879. My dear Mrs. Selden,

As usual your letter received a warm welcome, I had been looking for it for some time, for I wanted to write you from our new home.

You may know we were happy to get here and settled at last, after the

long weary waiting. We have been here more than two months now, and not one sigh of regret has yet escaped us, with regard to the location of our mission ground. We may have sighed for some other things, or on account of other things, but not that we are stationed in Bobbilly. We feel quite at home here and that these people are our people, and are only sorry that we cannot do more for them than we are at present doing. Sometimes we have to make haste slowly, I am doing a little this way among the women of Bobbilly. A converted Brahmin in Madras told me, first to make myself friendly with their women, and when they had got to know me and have confidence in me, then I could teach them what I pleased, I have thought of this advice a great many times since I came here, and have been trying to act on it somewhat. Here they know so little of Foreigners that they are particularly suspicious, so I try to do all I can to make the women feel that I am their friend. When am going through the streets if any women are at their doors and they usually are, to see the white woman and her children go by, except the gosha women, and if they do not run when I go near to them, I stop and talk a little, talk of their little ones and my school, or any thing else that I think will interest them, then when I first of May, but then came three weeks see them go past here, I go out and speak to them, or call them in, if I can put a word in for the Master without frightening them I try to do it. Several Brahmin and other high caste women have come to visit me, to see my house, they say, something they never did in Bimli, and have invited me to come and see them, just what I want to do. When they come here I show them the different rooms, and tell them their uses, shew my pictures and albums, and try to get them interested in some-

I was very glad she did so, for two reasons, I was glad to get another pupil, and equally glad she did as she had promised, we receive so many promises in this country that are never fulfilled, that it is cheering to us, when any person does as they promise.

As I write, three men are standing in the room looking all round at every thing, and just now I hear one reading the Teloogoo text that some person worked or painted and sent out to me in that box, of precious memory : "God is love," and "There is one Lord." "True words those are" say, and they read them again, and then ask leave to go, which is granted, after I tell them to remember these words. Scarcely a day passes in which there are not a number of persons who come round "to see" as they say when we ask what they want. These were standing looking in through the shutter of the door, and when I asked what they wished I received the customary answer, so I said, "See sirs," and they took it for a permit to come in, and came. I am glad they did for they have some precious words to carry away with them.

Last Sunday I invited Mr. C's. class of young men to come on Wednesday evenings and I would teach them to sing, six came last evening and made creditable progress with one hymn. If I can succeed in getting them to come regularly, we will hope to teach them something else besides singing, byeand-bye. In starting out anew this way. how little we know what will succeed, but we must try every plan that seems to be right and leave the result with Him who knows from the beginning whether this or that shall attended to.

We want you and all dear home folks to bear us and this new mission station on your hearts, and never forget us before the throne.

It was very hot here in April and the of rain and delightful cool weather, and just in the midst of the hot season too, it did seem as if Providence was favouring us especially. A heathen teacher in the Government School here told me one evening he thought it was a God-send to us, especially to us, for if it had been as hot this year as last, we could not have stood it, so we take it and are thankful, the weather has come in hot again now, but not so hot as before the rain, and it cannot continue very much longer.
