REUS.

THE MARQUIS OF LORNE has been on a visit to Annapolis and Yarmouth during the past week. Although comparatively a private one, yet the enthusiasm for the people was great, and His Excellency expressed himself much pleased at the reception given him. He was at Windsor on Wednesday. On Thursday, at 2 p. m. he arrived at Annapolis in his own car attached to the express train. After being introduced to a number of the leading men of the town, he walked to the steamer and amid deafening cheers left for Digby. On his arrival there he embarked on board the Western Counties train for Yarmouth. They arrived about seven o'clock, and the Governor General was welcomed at the railway station by a large crowd of citizens, who cheered him enthusiastically. The Artillery Company, in uniform, formed a guard of honor, and the Milton brass band played "God Save the Queen." The display of bunting was the largest and grandest ever witnessed in Yarmouth, numerous lines or flags spanning the streets. The town was brilliantly illuminated. The band played in front of the Lorne Hotel, where His Excellency stopped. On Friday morning the Governor General held a reception at the Court House, which was largely attended. Immediately afterwards he drove about the town for an hour. At a quarter to twelve he left by a special train for

Digby. A large crowd was at the station to witness his departure. The artillery company formed a guard of honor, and the Milton brass band played the National Anthem. His Excellency addressed the assemblage, expressing his gratification at the appearance of the town and his appreciation of the kind and cordial reception. He was accompanied as far as Weymouth by the artillery company, the band, the High Sheriff, the Warden, the President of the Western Counties Railway, Hon. L. E. Baker, and others.

On his return the Marquis arrived at Kentville on Saturday evening. Here he was met by a large and enthusiastic assembly of people. A loyal and patriotic address was presented by the Warden of King's County, J. W. Barris, Esq., and the Clerk of Council, L. De V. Chipman, Esq., on behalf of the citizens of "the garden County of Nova Scotia." His Excellency in reply to the regret expressed that the Princess had been prevented from accompanying him, said "None can regret more than she, that she cannot at present travel through the country which to her is not only of public, but also of private interest, as having been so long the residence of the Duke of Kent, whose services in this country has been repeated under happier auspices in her person." On Monday afternoon His Excellency left Windsor, and came to Windsor Junction, and took the T. C. R. to Truro and the Londonderry Iron Mines, and was expecting to proceed thence yesterday to Pictou, thence to embark in the steamer Druid for Sydney, and other points in Cape Breton.

The rate of assessment in Halifax this year will be: City Rates, 80 cents on \$100; County Rates, 12 cents on \$100; School Rates, 45 cents on \$100.

The rate last year was \$1.53. The decrease though small will be appreciated.

Dr. E. Jennings, coroner, held an inquest at the Hospital on Thursday last, on the body of Francis McNeil, a workman who fell from the top of the sugar refinery, through two hatches to a lower floor, on Wednesday afternoon, from the effects of which he died the same night. The jury returned a verdict of accidental death and exonerated the other workmen and employer from all blame.

Another accident occurred at the Sugar Refinery Thursday afternoon. Wm. Cook, one of the employed there, was working at a derrick, when his hand was drawn in by the rope around the windlass. The hand was cut so badly that it will probably have to be amputated.

On Tuesday morning John Lannan, a little four-year-old son of Mr. Thomas Lannan, carpenter, of South Hollis St., while his mother was getting breakfast ready, got a piece of bread and went down Henderson's wharf for a walk. About fifteen minutes later Mr. Henderson went down the wharf, and his attention was attracted by seeing bubbles rising on the water near the head of the north dock. Examination showed the body of little Lannan at the bottom. He immediately got it out and attempts at resuscitation were made, but without avail. It is supposed that the little fellow fell overboard, and struck his head on a rock in doing so, as there was a bruise on the side of his head.

Mr. Rose, accompanied by Mr. Stewart, one of the original proprietors of the Montague mine, in this county, brought to Halifax, a magnificent bar of gold weighing eight hundred ounces. It is the product of the famous Rose lead at Montague, and is said to have been obtained from 85 tons of quartz, and to represent the labor of fourteen men for six weeks.

There was a display of the electric light from George's Island on Friday night. It was witnessed and admired by many.

DR. C. COGSWELL was the recipient of a handsome bouquet from the Public Gardens on Tuesday, and in his letter to the Commissioners acknowledging receipt of it, he expresses his thanks for the kind and appropriate welcome he had been given by the Commissioners on his return to Halifax, and congratulated them on the success that had attended their efforts to improve the Gardens, and to make them a pleasant place of resort for their fellow citizens.

Five men belonging to the schooner Laura Nelson, of Gloucester, Mass., named Heber Cohoon, Angus McIsaac, Benjamin Burke, Duncan Campbell and Edward Cunningham, were picked up at sea in a dory on the 6th inst., by a Norwegian barque, on a voyage from Spain to St. Margaret's Bay, and landed at Sambro four days after. They had been adrift for thirty hours. They were brought to the city and forwarded to Boston by the American Consul General Judge Jackson.

On Thursday evening last a five-and-a-half year old son of Mr. Wm. H. Gould, of Kentville, was kicked so badly by a horse that he died the next day.

A little son, aged 6 years, of Mr. R. S. Crowe, Truro, had his arm broken on Wednesday last.

A bull seriously gored Capt. George C. Johnson, of Wolfville, one day last week.

A Temperance Convention was held at Liverpool, Queens Co., on Wednesday last, at which sixty delegates were present from various parts of the county. It was unanimously resolved to adopt the Scott Act. There is a general feeling in favor of the Act.

A temperance meeting was held at Bridgetown on the 3rd inst., to consider the advisability of adopting the Canada Temperance Act. The following resolution was almost unanimously adopted:

Whereas, in the judgment of the Supreme Court of Canada the Local Legislatures of the various Provinces have no power to prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors, in consequence of which chapter 75 of the Revised Statutes, fourth series, "Of Licenses for the sale of Intoxicating Liquors," is in that respect inoperative and void,

Therefore resolved, That immediate steps be taken to have the Canada Temperance Act submitted to the people at the polls, for the purpose of having it brought into operation in this country.
