WEYMOUTH, Jan. 24th, 1880.—Dear Sister Selden,—I feel much pleasure in informing you that we have succeeded in resuscitating the Woman's M. Aid Society in Weymouth.

For some time the Society has not held its meetings regularly, death has made irroads upon the ranks, many have grown cold and indifferent, and the few who seemed anxious for its promotion became discouraged, and but very little has been done in the way of raising money to send the Gospel to the perishing sisters in heathen lands. News.

The Nova Scotia Legislature has been summoned to meet on Thursday, February 26th.

On Saturday evening while Rev. John Abbott, Rector of St. Luke's, was walking on Pleasant Street, he slipped on the ice and fell heavily. He was picked up in an insensible condition and was found to have broken his collar bone.

On Sunday last three boys climbed over the fence and made their escape from the Halifax Poores' Asylum. They took the road, walked as far as Windsor Junction, when a man met them who told them it was useless for them to go to the country looking for work at this time of the year, and they decided to return to town. They arrived at the Police Station about 8 p. m.

Kings County shipped this season for Great Britain, United States and West Indies 233,004 bushels of potatoes, valued at \$73,883.

Councillor John Donovan, of Igonish C. B. missing ten days, was found dead in the woods on Tuesday 27th inst., four miles from Baddeck, about fifty yards from the Post road. He committed suicide by hanging. Cause temporary insanity.

Dr. Joseph Clark, of Pugwash, on Sunday evening, just before retiring, went into his surgery to get some medicine, and made a mistake taking carbolic acid instead of the preparation he intended to take. Before he had drank the whole dose he discovered his mistake and told his wife that he was poisoned. Dr. Donkin, who lives just across the street, was at once called and used all possible remedies, but he died in half an hour. The deceased has been in practice for a great number of years and has been particularly successful in the treatment of diphtheria. He leaves a wife and family besides a large circle of friends to mourn their loss.

The late Professor DeMille was announced to lecture in this city last evening, and his brother, Mr. A. H. DeMille, of St. John, to lecture in that city on the same evening.

At Archibald's tannery, Truro, a colored man named Paris was putting a belt on a pulley, when his coat sleeve caught on the spindle, and he was dragged up and whirled around about fifty times before the machinery could be stopped. He was very much bruised, several of his ribs being broken, and one of his legs fractured. His head was also badly bruised. His recovery is doubtful.

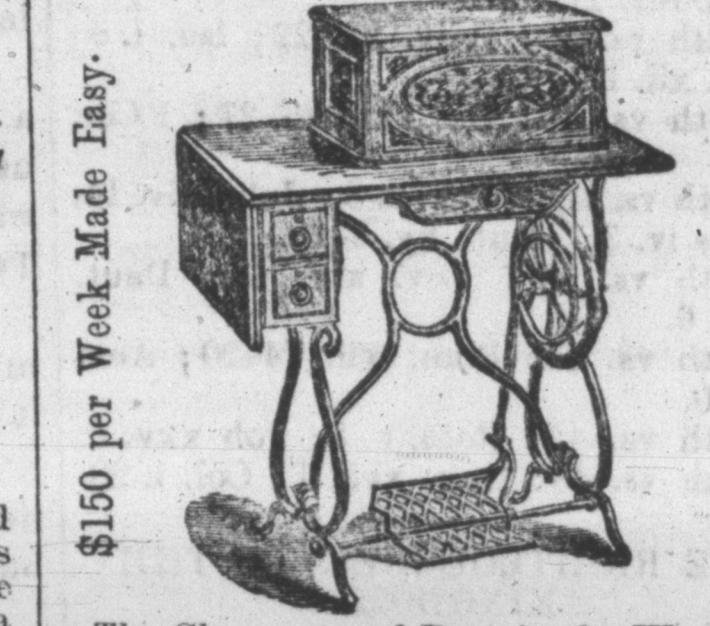
