DOMINION & FOREIGN NEWS.

DOMINION OF CANADA.—At the public meeting at Ottawa on Friday night, to consider relief for the Irish distress, \$650 were subscribed.

Hon. A. Mackenzie is confined to his house, in Toronto, by indisposition.

The formal opening of the Ice-Bridge Railway was to be on Saturday last. Two carloads of hay and an engine crossed on Friday.

NEW BRUNSWICK.—The New Brunswick Legislature is to meet for despatch of business on February 26th.

New Brunswick has in its registry 1,134 vessels, with a tonnage of 344,491. Compared with last year's report there is an increase in the number of vessels, but a decrease in the total tonnage.

Geo. W. Lefurgey, who was convicted on a charge of forging and uttering forged bills on the Union Bank of P. E. Island and the Merchants' Bank of Halifax, was on Saturday last sentenced at St. John, by Judge Duff to imprisonment in the Penitentiary for life.

P. E. ISLAND.—Charlottetown, has 298 vessels, tonnage 49,807—a decrease of 4,443 tons.

UNITED STATES.—The Supreme Court at Bangor, Maine, has rendered a decision to recognize the Fusion Legislature, and declaring that that now in session at the State House is the only legally organized body.

The riots at Liberty Furnace, Woodstock, Va., growing out of the attempt of the proprietors to engage negro hands ended by the employers yielding and discharging the negroes.

CUBA.—A Havana despatch says the earthquake of 25th almost wrecked the town of San Cristobal, nearly every house being damaged. The church and jail were made untenable, and fourteen inmates of the latter are in hospital from injuries. Emissions on the banks of the stream vary from 3 to 10 inches wide and from 40 to 100 feet long, from whence sulphurous flames were emitted after the quake. The inhabitants are leaving the place. The earthquake was also felt at many other cities, causing great terror.

ENGLAND.—Lord Beaconsfield is suffering from gout.

The Duchess of Marlborough's fund for the Irish distress amounts to £30,300.

A fire broke out in a biscuit factory at Dublin, on Tuesday. The flames spread rapidly, damage £50,000.

A return has been issued which gives the number of killed and wounded officers in the Zulu war as 60 against 72 in India.

FRANCE.—The Chamber of Deputies have adopted the clause of the bill relating to public meetings, supported by the Government in favor of the suppression of political clubs.

RUSSIA.—A letter from St. Petersburg, states that the increase of the German army has fallen like a thunderbolt upon the Russian people.

GERMANY.—The Minister of Public Worship will lay before the Diet a bill amending the May Laws, but no question of restoring to the church her former independence will be raised.

Borings in Hanover for petroleum show the existence of a basin as large and rich as Pennsylvania's in the opinion of experts.

ITALY.—A despatch from Rome to the Pall Mall Gazette says the condition of the Pope's health is causing anxiety. He suffers from fits of shivering and great prostration, but persists in his usual occupations.

Two Americans have been arrested at Naples charged with stealing 83,000 francs from a Russian officer at Brussels.

TURKEY.—A newspaper printed in English at Constantinople, has been suspended for criticizing the recent honors bestowed upon Hafiz Pacha, Minister of Police, lately decorated with the order of the Mejidie and appointed aide-de-camp to the Sultan. The printing office was closed by the police. The latter act in violation of the terms of capitulation, and the Porte will be called to account for permitting it.

INDIA.—The leading Afghan Sidars ordered the Kohistanes to refuse supplies to the British.

The Ghuznees have sent word to General Roberts that they have determined to fight to the last extremity unless Yakooob Khan be reinstated as Ameer. It is generally believed that an army corps will advance to Herat, and that that district will be transferred to Persia.

All officers belonging to the Cabul division now on leave are ordered to rejoin their command by March 15th, when operations through Afghanistan will recommence.

The News Cabul despatch says the ex-governor of Jelallabad is now within one day's march of Ghuznee, with a number of guns, and some Sepoys, and has announced his intention to attack the British.
