

in case the elections are adverse to the Government, and Lord Beaconsfield might therefore appoint his successor; but he probably will not.

The difficulty about Gladstone's position will probably be settled by his becoming head of the new Government with the understanding that after a year or two he shall retire from Parliament and be succeeded by Lord Granville.

A Baden letter describes the Queen as exasperated against Beaconsfield, alleging he deceived her respecting the real feeling of the country and alienated a most loyal portion of her dominions.

The Queen is expected to arrive in England by the end of this week. We may therefore expect that a very few days will see the formal close of Beaconsfield's administration.

Mr. Gladstone declines a public reception in London.

Parnell has received the freedom of the city of Cork for his services in behalf of Ireland.

A medical student of Queen's College at Cork, has been rusticated for a year for having got up an address to Parnell on his return from America.

FRANCE.—Ex-Empress Eugenie, before starting for Zululand, presented her Imperial Crown to the Church of Notre Dame des Victories, Paris.

The bishops at the head of the Paris Catholic University have decided to conform to the law as embodied in Ferry's educational bill by altering the name of the institution to that of the Catholic Institute.

The Bishops protest against the decrees relating to unauthorized religious congregations.

A Frenchman named Walton was assassinated on his way to Sumatra. He was entrusted by the French Government with a scientific mission to the island of Soede.

GERMANY.—The decision of the Emperor regarding Bismarck's resignation has not yet been made known.

The Emperor has had a long conference with the Crown Prince, at which it was determined that Bismarck should remain in office. It is reported that Bismarck is quite ill.

TURKEY.—A private letter from Aleppo, dated 18th March, says:—"In consequence of the famine four thousand Koords descended from the mountains, plundered the town of Mardeen, in Asiatic Turkey, and murdered a number of priests and nuns and some European merchants."

The Porte has stepped the work of Colonel Baker (Baker Pasha) in Asia Minor.

There is a terrible famine in Mosul, Turkish Koordistan. Four thousand of the inhabitants have fled to Bagdad and hundreds have died on the road.

A Constantinople correspondent of the Times telegraphs that the elections in England produced on all classes a profound impression, and at the Palace almost a panic. Greeks, Armenians, Bulgarians and Christians generally have long regarded Beaconsfield as their most powerful opponent, and rejoice at his fall.

RUSSIA.—Gortschakoff is dying. He passed a very bad Saturday night, and is very weak. The Czar visited him on Sunday.

INDIA.—The British commissioner brought a letter from the Viceroy of India to Sirdar Shere Ali, informing him that the Queen confers on him the sovereignty of the Province of Candahar, with the title of Wali.

A despatch from Bombay to the Standard says the report of Mahmoud Jan's death is untrue.

Abdul Rahaman Khan has reached Ghazi on the road to Chaukau. He has written to the Kohistanes to join him, and already 3,000 irregulars have left in obedience to this order.

BURMAH.—Several Chinese firms here have received intelligence that Thebau, King of Burmah, has died of small-pox at Mandalay. Their agents advise them to keep back their goods, as there are fears of civil war in Burmah.

The reports of the death of King Thebau, of Burmah, cannot be traced to an authentic source, but an indiscriminate human sacrifice has been offered at Mandalay to save his life.

SOUTH AMERICA.—Panama papers of the 31st ult. have two accounts of a recent battle at Moguega. One states that the Peruvians surprised the Chilians and slaughtered a whole regiment, driving others to the main body of the Chilian army. Another report states that the Chilian army attempted to surprise the Peruvians, but were ambuscaded and badly routed. Out of 1,200 men in a crack regiment only 67 escaped. The total loss of the Chilians was 1,300 killed, besides wounded and prisoners. Ten thousand troops have been ordered to reinforce the Chilians.
