

Capt. Tower, arrested on a charge of scuttling the barque "Brother's Pride," in May last, was arraigned in the St. John Police Court on Tuesday last.

Thomas Sloven, who has saved the lives of more than a dozen persons in the St. John harbor was presented by the Mayor on Saturday with a purse of \$207.

UNITED STATES.—The Republican convention at Harrisburg, Pa., by a vote of 133 to 113, instructed its delegates to vote for the nomination of Grant for the Presidency.

A despatch from Denver, says that on the 27th ult. the Utes attacked a supply train, carrying 30,000 rounds ammunition, 10,000 lbs. rations and forage for Major Morrow's command, 30 miles northwest of Palomas.

The Colorado delegation in Congress and Governor Pitkin called on the President, and represented the defenceless condition of the frontier settlements of Colorado.

The storm on Tuesday was very severe. At Long Branch, N. J., the gale did immense damage. Nearly all the hotels there were unroofed.

A terrible story comes from Londonderry, New Hampshire, of the murder of Mrs. Dillingham by her husband's nephew, who resided in the family.

The brig Guisborough, of Windsor, N. S., was dismantled and sunk at North Post L. I. The crew are supposed to have been drowned, as nothing has been seen of them, but they may have been picked up.

On Friday night three burglars entered a bank, at Knoxville, Ill., seized the president, E. C. Kunkle, who sleeps in the building, and after gagging and beating him and burning his feet in a shocking manner to compel him to give up the combination, departed, taking \$2,300 which had not been locked up.

ENGLAND.—The Imperial Parliament was opened by the Queen in person, on Friday last. The procession was a most gorgeous one and comprised seven equipages. The first five, each drawn by six bay horses, led by four grooms walking, conveyed the great officers of state.

The Queen's carriage was the seventh and the last in the cortege. It was drawn by eight cream colored horses, each led by a groom. In this carriage were the Queen-Empress, Princess Beatrice and the Duchess of Wellington, Mistress of the Robes.

When Her Majesty was seated on the throne in the House of Lords, she handed the Opening Speech to Lord Cairns to read. A few sentences may give our readers an idea of its general tenor:

"My relations with all Powers continue friendly." "Much remains to be done to repair the disorder the late war caused in many parts of the Turkish Empire."

"After noticing the treachery and terrible massacre of the Embassy in Cabul it proceeds: "While determined to make the frontiers of the Indian Empire strong, I desire to be in friendly relations alike with the ruler and people of Afghanistan."

"My anticipations as to an early peace in South Africa have been fulfilled. The capture of the position of the Zulu King and the breaking up of the military organization on which his dynasty was based relieved my possessions there from the danger which impeded their advancement and consolidation.

A serious deficiency in the usual crops in some parts of Ireland has rendered necessary special proceedings on the part of my Government to guard against the calamities with which those districts are threatened."

Lord Beaconsfield and Lord Salisbury were not present at the opening. The Queen's reception by the crowd in the street was very enthusiastic. Seats to view the Royal procession brought heavy prices.

In the House of Lords Earl Beaconsfield announced that a telegram had just been received from Sir Bartle Frere which gave promise of carrying out a scheme of confederation in South Africa. He said the Government was opposed to annexation in Afghanistan.

The Duke of Argyll attacked General Roberts and the Anglo-Turkish Convention. Lord Cranbrook replied to the Duke of Argyll and defended the Government.

In the Commons the Marquis of Hartington criticized the Government in regard to its methods for relieving the distress in Ireland.

Sir Stafford Northcote said there was nothing in the state of the country rendering a dissolution of Parliament necessary.

The Sister, a thirty-eight ton turret gun of the Thunderer, was burst on Tuesday the 3rd inst., in an experiment, by which it was loaded with a double charge of eighty and 110 pounds of powder, and one 600 pound common shell and a 700 pound Palliser projectile.

FRANCE.—The formidable system of fortifications intended to make Paris impregnable may now be said to be completed. Twenty-two persons were killed and 116 wounded by a recent railway accident.

The Budget Committee proposes a vote of credit of eight millions of francs for the construction of subterranean telegraph lines.

SPAIN.—By the recent hurricane in the Philippine Islands, twenty-five vessels, of various classes, were wrecked, including four foreign frigates. A large number of other vessels were damaged. Forty-six persons were drowned.

ITALY.—The new session of Parliament opens on the 17th. A despatch from Naples says an eruption of Mount Vesuvius began on Saturday.

RUSSIA.—A trustworthy account represents the internal condition of Russia as becoming more critical. A number of officers high in command have become disaffected, while those who were not promoted after the late war with Turkey have with few exceptions joined the revolutionists.

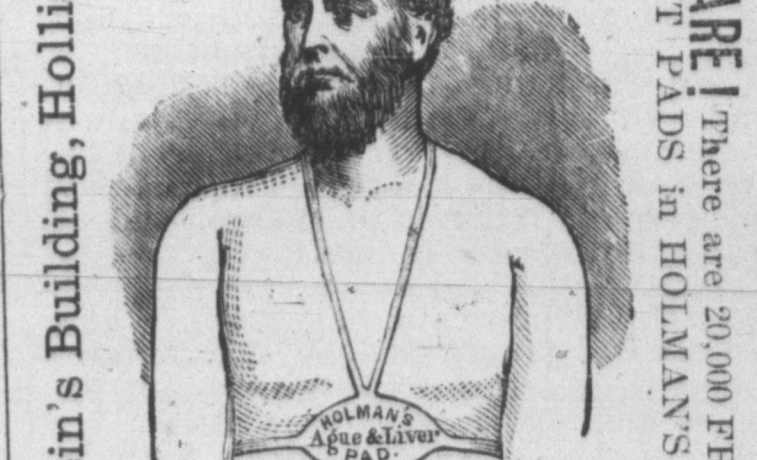
Several new measures will be announced on the 25th anniversary of the Czar's accession. Among these will be proposals to place the Jews upon the same footing as other Russians and extending to Poland all regulations existing in the rest of Russia.

INDIA.—Mahomed Jan has established a chain of armed posts on the Turkestan and Ghuznee roads, where his officers search persons passing to and fro from Cabul.

General Roberts writes from Cabul:—"Before Nov. 12th, 1879, about 73 men were executed, viz., the City Kotwal (the margarata) and six others, convicted of dishonoring the bodies of the British Embassy; seventeen convicted for attacking escort to the Embassy, and having property of the Embassy in their possession; and forty-nine convicted for proved murder of camp followers and implication in the attack on the British residency. Since Nov. 12th nine were executed on conviction for attacking the residency, and fifteen more sentenced to death for killing wounded soldiers and implication in the attack on the residency."
