# VILLE.

The Provincial Agricultural and Industrial Exhibition held at Kentville last week, was attended by a vast multitude of people. On Wednesday there were probably seven or eight thousand persons on the grounds and in the large building at one time.

This building, erected in 1877, is finely situated on an elevated level and in the middle of a fine property, exactly suited for such purpose, about half a mile north of the town. It is reached by a good road, cut through sand and rock. The grounds are surrounded by a high board fence, effectually excluding intruders.

The Exhibition Building has a high tower at the end, forming the main entrance. The interior is provided with length of the main floor. It also has a deep gallery running all around, in which there is room for some exhibits and a clear passage for visitors.

The first opening was on Tuesday without ceremony, but the formal opening on Wednesday was done by General Sir Patrick McDougal. John W. Barss, Esq., chairman of the General Committee received His Excellency and Lady McDougall, with Colonel Laurie and Lady. They were afterwards conducted to the end gallery where the 97th Band had been previously giving some inspiring strains to the delight of the thousands assembled, filling all parts of the building.

Rev. Dr. Hill, Dr. Hamilton, C, F Eaton, Esq., W. L. Bill, Esq., M. P. P., Wm. Ackhurst, Esq., and others were also on the platform.

Mr. Barss in a few appropriate remarks, introduced Colonel Laurie, Chairman of the Central Board of Agricul-

Colonel Laurie made an excellent speech, and spoke as a practical man to his brother farmers. In referring to the cattle trade which Nova Scotia has been so much pressed to enter upon he said there was much room for improved methods of feeding. He believed with more careful and correct modes Nova Scotia was capable of turning out agricultural products as cheap, and as good as Manitoba, Ontario, or any part of this continent. With more attention to root crops there was nothing to prevent the greatest prosperity to the farmer in cash returns, and yet to be able to keep up and maintain the productiveness of their farms.

General McDougall then made the grand opening speech passing very high compliments on the people of this county and evidences all around of their successful farming, and especially in the cultivation of fruit. He also spoke of the work of the ladies which appeared so abundant, in the form of very handsome rugs, and various other useful and ornamental articles.

Mr. Matheson of the Pictou Board of Agriculture then offered a few words of congratulation.

Mr. S. L. Peters, President of the Provincial Farmers' Association of New Brunswick spoke in high praise of the energy and intelligence which must have been put forth in the production of such results as were before them. He believed that his own province gave more attention to manufactures, and invited the people to come to St. John and see for themselves what had been effected in that province in this direction, as well as in agricultural produc-

tiveness It would be in vain for us to attempt to give any proper account of the exhibits. II. In MATHEMATICS.—Arithmetic; Euclid's Elements of Geometry, Books I. and 11; Algebra, Simple Rules and Simple Equations of one unknown quantity, not involving Surds.

111. In English.—Grammar; History of England; Geography; Composition. The subjects for entrance into the first year of the Science course are

I. In MATHEMATICS .- Same as for the First Year in Arts. II. In English.—The same as for the first year in Arts.

III. IN LATIN OR GREEK OR FRENCH:-Latin.—The subjects of the Matriculation Examination for the First Year in Arts. German.—Grammar and Translation.

French.—Grammar and Translation. The following Bursaries and Scholarships are offered for competition at the Matriculation Examinations :-

### 1.—The Munro Bursaries.

GEORGE MUNRO, Esq., the founder of the Munro Professorship of Physics in this University, offers this year seven Bursaries for competition at the Matriculation Exami-

The value of each of these Bursaries is Two Hundred Dollars yearly with Free Class Tiekets for the first two years of the Undergraduate Course, taken consecutively; provided that the holder of Bursary gain a Certificate of Merit at the Sessional Examinations of the first year. After these two years, the Bursaries are again to be competed for, and will be held during the third and fourth years of the Course, on Terms similar

to those of the preceding years. These seven Bursaries are allotted for competition to students from the following five districts of Nova Scotia, and from New Brunswick and Prince Edwards Island, one

to each, viz.: 1. The Island of Cape Breton. Pictou, Antigonish and Guysboro. Colchester, Cumberland and Hants. Halifax, Lunenburg and King's. 5. Annapolis, Digby, Yarmouth, Shelburne and Queen's.

6. New Brunswick. 7. Prince Edward Island. Candidates must satisfy the Principal, before the week in which the Examinations are held, with respect to the districts to which

they belong, and as coming from which Students who have already Matriculated at any College are disqualified for competi-

The Bursaries will be awarded to those Students from the several districts mentioned, who make the highest total of marks at the Matriculation Examinations: but no Bursary will be awarded unless a Standard of Merit, determined by the Senate, shall be reached by the candidate.

The Examinations for the Munro Bursaries are the same as those for Professors' Scholarships. Further information may be obtained on

application to the Principal. 2.—Professors' Scholarships. Two Scholarships, entitling to free attendance on all the Classes of the Under-

graduate Courses in Arts. The subjects of Examinations for these Scholarships this year are nearly the same as those for Matriculation in Arts at the

English: Grammar, Analysis, Outline of English and Canadian History, and General Geography.

One Scholarship entitling to free attendance on all the classes of the Undergraduate courses in Science, is offered by the Professors this year for competition at the Matriculation Examination. The subjects are the same as those of the Matriculation Examination in Science.
