Actus.

At the monthly meeting of the N. S. Historical Society held in the Legislative Library on Friday evening, it was announced that from March 1st to date, donations had been received consisting of 6 volumes of manuscripts, 44 vols. of newspapers, 96 vols. of books and 208 pamphlets.

Communications were read from several persons, among which was one from the City Engineer, asking the assistance of the Society in securing old plans, &c., in order that some disputed questions respecting the Common might be amicably settled.

The Poultry and Pet-Stock Association Exhibition at Freemason's Hall last week was well attended. Eggs and dead poultry made a good show. A dressed Turkey was on exhibition which weighed 33 lbs. A prize was given for the best dressed Turkey, not the largest bird but the one best dressed.

On Wednesday last a large fire occurred on McDaniel's Wharf, Upper Water Street. It first appeared about noon in a room used for drying wool in the establishment of Mr. Stackpole. It soon spread to Mr. Geo. Davidson's feed store and to a building of Messrs Hart & Murray. Some narrow escapes of serious accidents occurred during the progress of the fire, to firemen and others. The buildings were greatly damaged. They were partially insured.

The Women's Christian Association gave a musical entertainment on Friday evening in the Y. M. C. A. Hall which was largely attended. The pieces were well rendered and afforded immense satisfaction to the audience. The Society is doing an excellent work in behalf of women.

Mrs. Sullivan, one of the oldest inhabitants—perhaps the oldest—of the Province, died at Portuguese Cove, on Tuesday, in the 105th year of her age.

Half of Marshal MacMahon's Paris mansion Rue Bellechasse, is to be sold for \$64,000. It is said that family affairs have led to this sacrifice, as the Marshal spent much of his private income when he was in power.

A girl named Bessie McGillvray died of a small pox at North Sydney last week. No new cases are reported.

A she bear was shot in her den in Queens county a few days ago. There was a cub apparently about three weeks old, in the den with her. The cub was captured alive.

At Yarmouth on Saturday last a small steamer, called the Carrie, was launched from the yard of the Burrell Johnson Iron Co., by whom the hull and the machinery were constructed throughout. Her dimensions are: Length, fifty four feet; beam, twelve; depth, five. The engine is surface condensing of twelve horse power; the hull is built entirely of oak. The Carrie is owned by the Portland Packing Company, of Rockland Maine, and is to be employed at Clark's Harbor, Cape Island, in connection with the lobster business. Another steamer, a tug, is being built by them and will be launched next week.

FRINK'S REFLECTORS.—The time has long gone by when halls and public buildings had to be sufficiently lighted with a few scattered gas burners or oil lamps; and the powerful reflectors that now throw their light upon audiences that are gathered in our large buildings tell luminously of the progress of the age, and the inventive genius of Mr. I. P. Frink, by whom they are chiefly made. The forms of this reflector are so familiar that it is not necessary to describe them, as there is hardly a hall or a church in the country of any pretensions where they may not be found, and we presume it is safe to say there is not one where they have not answered perfectly all that is claimed for them. The heat of the lamps or gas draws up the foul air, which passes through an opening in the reflector in the roof thus keeping the atmosphere free from noxious odors and substances; whilst the reflection obtained from it is superior to any other form of lamp or burner in use. It is stated by those who use it that the economy of the arrangement is remarkable. Mr. Frink is also the patentee of the window reflectors which are needed to throw light into dark offices and counting rooms which in cities, where economy of space is an object, are too frequent. In such this invention if found to be invaluable.

Mr. Robert Lawson, of Kentville, recently received a cheque from a man now living in Chicago, as compensation for wood stolen from Mr. Lawson's land at the N. W. Arm, Halifax, some thirty years ago.

Cremation is steadily increasing in favour in Northern Italy. Within the last four years fifty cases have taken place in Milan and ten in the neighbouring town of Lodi, while three fresh cases have already been reported this month.

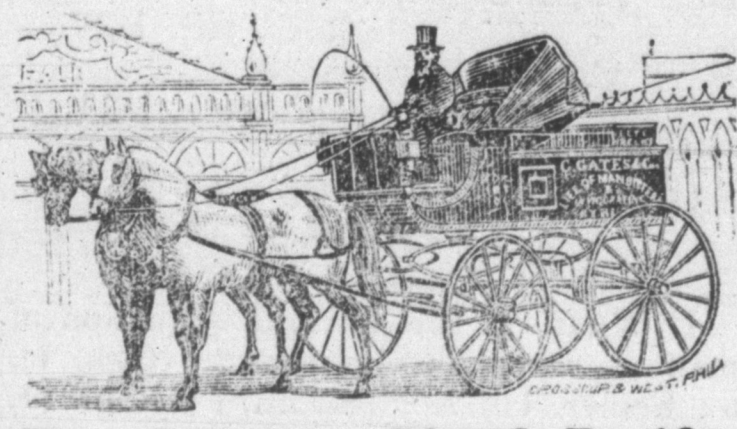

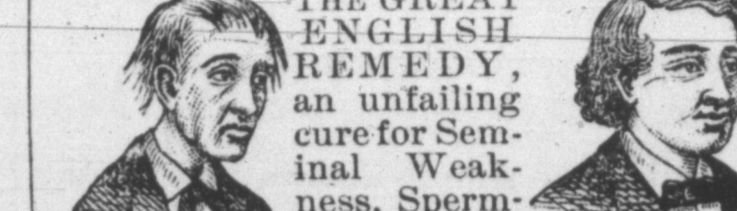

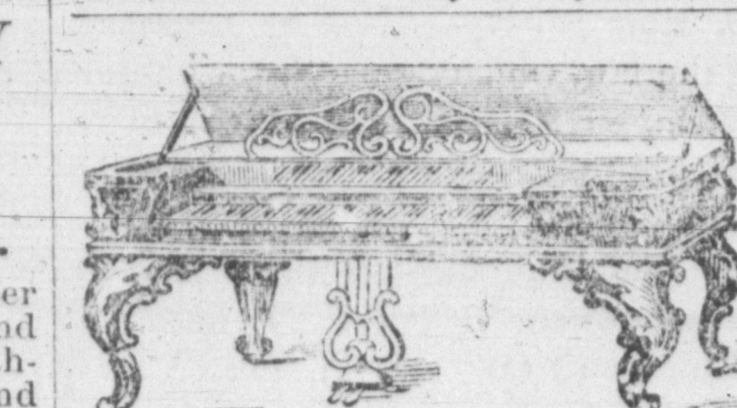
