

Citizens' Protective Union and the arrest of Kearney were vigorously denounced. There was a severe gale, on Tuesday, in Sacramento Valley. Much damage was done by the unroofing and blowing down of houses and other buildings.

The Insane Asylum at Ossawatimie, Kansas, caught fire on Tuesday evening last, and was damaged to the extent of \$40,000.

Mr. Parnell has returned to England to take part in the elections. He says he has visited sixty-two cities on this side of the Atlantic, and \$200,000 is subscribed, of which some \$120,000 has been remitted to Ireland.

ENGLAND.—In the House of Commons the Chancellor of the Exchequer, said the writs for the new election would probably be issued on the 24th inst., the day after the House of Commons separates.

The whole country is greatly excited and it is well that the elections will come off so early. A large number of the members of Parliament have already left to prepare for the election.

The manifestoes of the opposing parties have been published and are being circulated among the electors.

Sir Stafford Northcote has issued an address to his constituents, in which he says; "Notwithstanding the great expenses, the taxation of the country is lighter than in almost any year previous to the accession of the present Government to power, while the real amount of the national debt stands now at eighteen millions below the sum at which we found it. The war into which, but for a decided policy, we should probably have been drawn would be extremely burdensome to taxpayers. Should the elections result in the reward of confidence in the present ministry it will be our earnest endeavor to show ourselves worthy thereof by pursuing the same policy which we maintain in the sight of the empire and the world."

The Budget shows that the revenue this year yielded £2,195,000 less than estimated.

Mr. Gladstone in his address to the electors of Mid Lothian among other things, says, "As to the colonies, liberal administration gave them popular and responsible Government. They undertook to defend Canada with the whole strength of the empire and recognized the great scheme for uniting the several settlements of British North America in one Dominion."

FRANCE.—The prevalence of small pox in Paris is causing much alarm.

A council of Ministers resolved that a compromise shall be accepted in consequence of the defeat of article seven of Ferry's Education Bill.

A man named Cerina had a narrow escape from drowning at Sydney a few days ago. His horse and sleigh broke through the ice, and but for timely assistance they would have all gone to the bottom.

AUSTRIA.—The ice in the Vistula is accumulating. On the Austro-Russian frontier, near Dzikow, the river broke through the dyke and flooded thirty villages, some of which are completely destroyed. Thousands of persons are without shelter or food, and many cattle are lost.

RUSSIA.—At a great fire on Monday at the weaving works in Moscow, twenty-four persons were burned to death and twenty nine injured.

It is said that the Duchess of Edinburgh will remain at St. Petersburg for the present.

INDIA.—A despatch from Lahore says: Mahomed Jan, with 11,000 men, is between Ghuznee and the first stage on the Cabul road.

Special reports brought in by spies say Mahomed Jan's followers are increasing enormously. His agents are recruiting in all directions.

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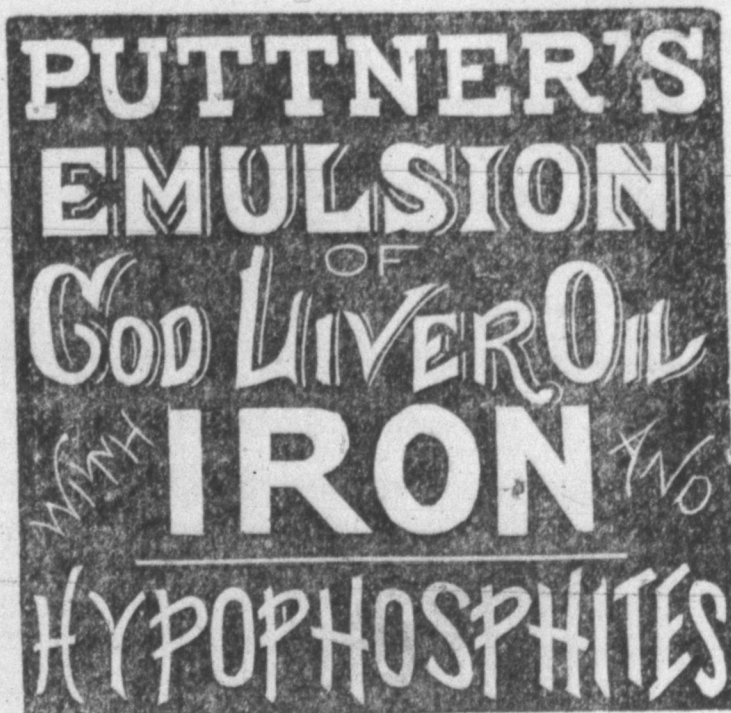
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
