

In notices of marriage is it desirable to state in what house the marriage took place? I have sometimes written, "at the residence of the bride's father" or "mother," but it seemed to me a hackneyed phrase that spoiled the notice.

We do not think there is any necessity for stating more than the place and date of marriage, and name of the officiating minister. Further details rather detract from the announcement and from the parties concerned.

News.

PROVINCIAL APPOINTMENTS.—Inverness Co.—To be a Justice of the Peace—Dugald A. McFarlane, South West Margaree. Annapolis Co.—To be a Justice of the Peace,—Inglis P. Goucher, Melvern Square.

The Government steamer Glendon arrived on Sunday afternoon from the Eastern shore, having been there with provisions for the distressed fishermen. When the steamer arrived at Canso, on Wednesday last, the harbor was full of ice, but the gale of Thursday and Friday broke it up. Seventy barrels of flour were left at Isaac's Harbor, two hundred and ten barrels at Canso, and a hundred barrels at Whitehaven.

The scarcity of hay is very severely felt in Londonderry and Economy. Several carloads of oats have been brought from New Brunswick to Londonderry, which have been eagerly purchased, to enable starving cattle to eke out an existence.

It is said that as the Temperance Hall does not pay the interest of the Preferential Shares it will be sold at auction.

The annual meeting of the Starr Manufacturing Company, was very satisfactory. Under the vigorous management of the directors, the company has been raised from its difficulties and put into a good condition. The preferential stock has been gradually reduced, the ten per cent. on it paid, and now a dividend of four per cent. has been declared on the old stock.

Owing to the prevalence of diphtheria at Digby the schools have been closed, and clergymen have been requested by the Board of Health "to cease holding night meetings, as they are in a large measure the cause of the spread of the disease."

It has been officially announced that Her Majesty's grant to the mothers of triplets does not extend to the colonies.

Over 200 immigrants arrived by the English mail steamer at Halifax, on Sunday before last.

The "Temple" mine at Montague Halifax Co., has been sold to Mr. Hiram Baker, of Farmington, U. S., and others, for \$18,000.

A man killed three seals on the bank of the River Hebert, one day last week.

The bill to abolish the Legislative Council of P. E. I. was defeated in that body by the casting vote of the President.

Rev. D. McMillan, of North Sydney, while visiting, hitched his horse in a yard. The animal got away, fell over a cliff, and was instantly killed. Mr. McMillan's friends promptly raised a sum which indemnified him for his loss.

Most of the Sunday Schools in Halifax, on Sunday last had a Temperance Lesson, the International Series had left it a sort of undecided open day.

There was a great storm on Wednesday last. It seems to have been very severe in Annapolis and Digby Counties. It is said the Annapolis Basin was like a little sea, rolling up huge breakers. The Scud, with over three hundred passengers, was unable to make her return trip, and anchored during the night and day under the lee of Bear Island. The roads were much blocked by the heavy snow that fell. The Quebec train on Saturday was about 12 hours behind time.

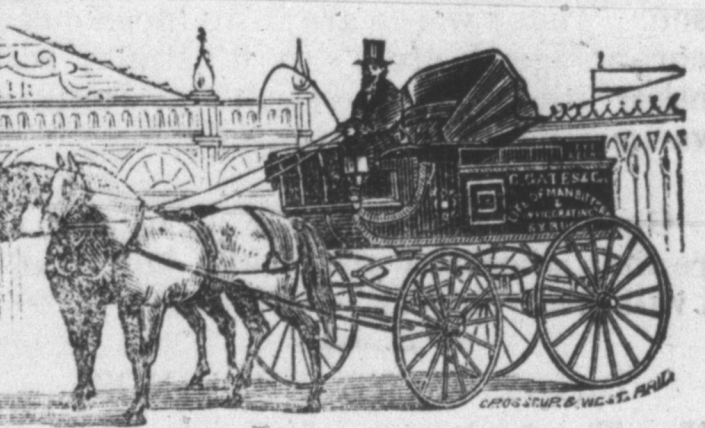

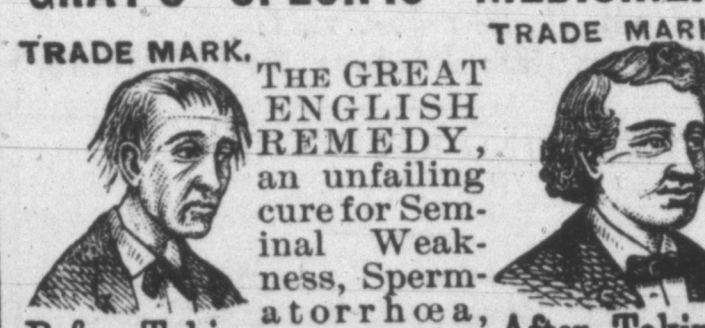

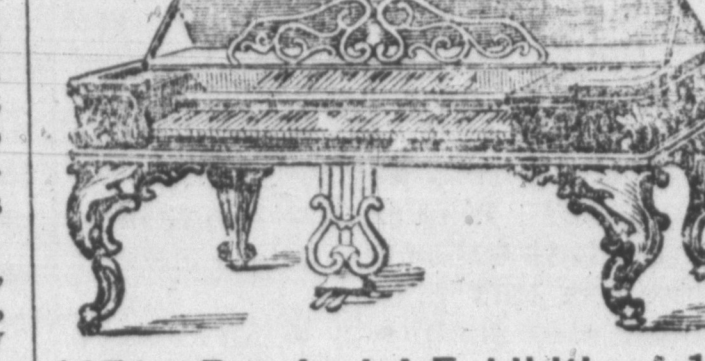
