

The Irish Times gives prominence to a statement that the Land Leaguers are to be tried by a special commission, issued under the Queen's patent, in order to remove any cause of complaint of unfair trial.

The greatest excitement prevailed at Monaghan. Lord Rossmore was accompanied by Lord Mandeville, who would assist at the anti-League meeting. Mandeville telegraphed to his agent at Portadown to send 10,000 men to Scots-town without delay. Another telegram was despatched to the District Grand Master of the Orangemen of Armagh to send 1,000 men. Similar telegrams were sent to Lord Crichton to send 1,000 men from Fermanagh. These are certain to arrive, and the number will be more than doubled by men from Monaghan and the surrounding neighbourhood. The men will be supplied with means of defence.

Mr. Foster has issued a memorandum to the magistrates, pointing out that under certain Acts of Parliament, persons assembling armed, or disguised, or assuming the name of any society, to the terror of Her Majesty's subjects, are guilty of high misdemeanor, rendering them liable to imprisonment; as are also these who by threats endeavor to compel any person to quit his employment, or publish, or write anything calculated to excite riot or unlawful assembly. All magistrates and constables are bound to apprehend, oppose and disperse persons engaging in these practices, and they can command all persons to assist them.

The correspondent of the Times at Dublin, commenting on the above, says: "The truth is, magistrates, agents and landlords generally are panic stricken, and do not venture to enforce the law."

At Armagh Assizes on Wednesday, a farmer was sentenced to 20 years' penal servitude for firing at his landlord.

Parnell received two threatening letters during his stay in Waterford, one of which accuses him of destroying the country to benefit his own pocket.

Gornley, who shot the bailiff near Cocksburn, has been committed on a charge of wilful murder.

SOUTH AFRICA.—MORE TROUBLE.—Affairs in Transvaal are very serious. The Boers are assembling in large numbers, and threaten to resort to force.

FRANCE.—Up to noon on Thursday last 1,200,000 Panama Canal shares were applied for in Europe.

GERMANY.—Four Socialists have been arrested at Darmstadt, on a charge of high treason. Sixteen persons have been imprisoned at Pforzheim for circulating revolutionary publications.




