

Sudden Death.

MR. THOMAS ANSLEY MARSHALL of Harmony, Aylesford, went to the woods to chop on Wednesday afternoon, February 25th. Near night his wife discovered him leaning against a fence, on the opposite side about sixteen rods from his house. On going to him she found him speechless, and apparently unconscious. From examination it appeared, that he had fallen a tree; which lodged against another, and broke it down; and one of these had struck his head, and fractured his skull. He seemed to have lain some time, and then arisen and gone toward home till a fence stopped him. Though he never spoke, yet he lingered till the morning of the 27th Feb: 1880, when he expired, at the age of 48 years; leaving a deeply sorrowing widow, seven children, an aged father, and numerous other relatives.

The mourners, however, while deeply grieved by this sudden bereavement, may well be consoled by the cheering hope that, though absent from the body, he is present with the Lord. He had been a regular member of a Baptist Church for about six years; was an obliging neighbor, a kind husband and father, and a consistent Christian.

Brother and sister Marshall had been called to part with a dear child, Caroline, aged seven years, on the 25th day of December last. As she with a number of others in the settlement, died of diphtheria, it was not deemed prudent to have any public religious service at the time of her burial. Her parents therefore requested that for the benefit of the family and others, particular reference should be made to this visitation of Providence in a sermon to be preached at Greenwood on Lord's day, Feb. 29.

It is a remarkable circumstance, that at that very time and place the funeral of the father was attended, and a discourse delivered by the writer, to a large and solemn assembly, from the words of David, (1 Saml. xx. 3.) "There is but a step between me and death."—Communicated by Rev. C. Tupper.
