News.

We learn that the cargo of apples sent to Great Britain by the steamer Solway, has been sold at highly satisfactory prices.

A cattle shipment is to take place per steamship "Edinburgh" from Halifax, the first of Messrs. Dickey & Buckley's contract. This firm will ship 325 head, all picked up in the vicinity of Amherst; Mr. Josiah Wood, 25 head; Fawcett Bros., 25 head, and Mr. Fader, 25 head. Besides this, Messrs. Dickey & Buckley expect to ship 150 tons of dead meat, in a refrigerator. Messrs. Fitchett and Chas. Boss are now in Boston, superintending the construction of a refrigerator to be placed on board the steamship.—Sackville Post.

The Halifax Chamber of Commerce held a meeting on Friday, and received the report of the committee appointed to nominate the delegates to go to Ottawa to urge the Winter Port scheme upon the Government. The names of the following gentlemen were handed in by the committee and accepted by the Chamber, viz.: Messrs. J. J. Bremner, T. E. Kenny, J. S. Maclean, M. Dwyer, and possibly Mr. A. Burns, the latter gentleman at the present time being absent from the city. It was left with Mr. Bremner to communicate with Messrs. Richey and Daly, in accordance with the resolution passed at the previous meeting, in reference to the time when the delegation would start for Ottawa.

The funeral of Mrs. Coalfleet and her child, who were frozen to death on the wreck of the Happy Home, took place in Hantsport on Sunday, 9th. The Rev. Mr. Whitman preached an eloquent and touching sermon on the occasion to a very large congregation. The second mate, Mr. Davidson, was in a very low condition at Hantsport, but is recovering, and Captain Coalfleet will be brought home as soon as he can bear the trip.—Windsor Mail.

The Eastern Chronicle says the shaft of the Food Pit has been cleared out down to the water and is found to be very little injured. The water in the pit, although it must have been very cold when it was flowing in, as it was frosty weather at the time, is found to be still quite hot, showing that there must have been a large body of fire in the workings. The work of opening up the new seam is progressing favorably. The Cage Pit shows no signs of fire at present. Of course all the openings are closely covered. The carbonic acid gas is still flowing in, and is evidently having the desired effect.

On Sunday morning, when the Brunswick St. Methodist Church was opened, a man dressed in white woolen clothing was found in the basement. He was evidently out of his mind, and could give no explanation of how he got there. He was handed over to the police, and turned out to be a pauper lunatic of a harmless character, who recently escaped from the Poor's Asylum.

The collection for the Pope known as "Peter's Pence," was taken up in the City Roman Catholic Churches on Sunday last, and about \$900 were realized.

BADDECK OIL NOTES.—According to promise, I have visited the works at Baddeck Valley, and I am happy to say the sinking of the well is progressing favorably. They are now about two hundred feet down, having passed the slate rock, and are now into black shale, which smells strongly of oil, with good dry black soot coming up with the water. While I was there, I saw the men putting down a six inch casing, which they say will shut off all the surface water, and give them a dry well. One is struck forcibly with the idea, on arriving at the works, that you are driving into the suburbs of some manufacturing city, or into a railway station, as you hear the engine puffing and whistling, with spurts of steam flying into the air. I sincerely trust that the day is not far distant when the sound of the engines in Baddeck Valley will reverberate round those beautiful mountains which surround the scene of the oil works. There is a stir and a life now about the oil business, which we hope will soon add to the commerce of the county, heretofore unknown.—Com. to N. S. Herald.
