NORTHERN AFRICA—Ali Bey, supported by French troops, who, however, did not participate in the engagement, dislodged a large force of insurgents from a strong position after four hours fighting. The Arabs fled.

The Bey has signed an order authorizing the occupation of Kairwah by the French troops. In case of a siege artillery is being mounted at the Citadel and a large fort outside the principal gate. The insurgents attacked a strong French force near Susa. The French suffered some loss.

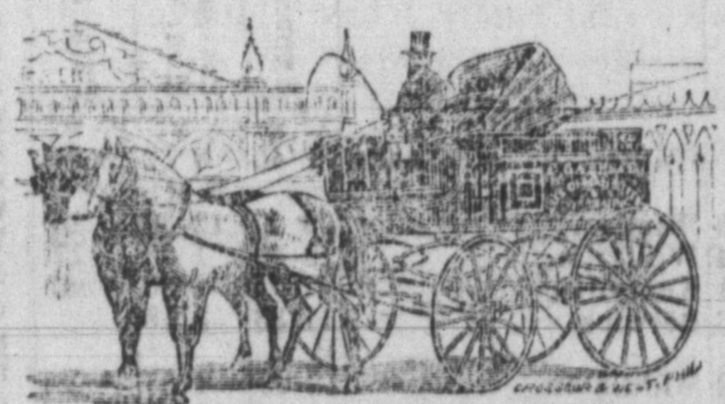
