DOMINION OF CANADA. -- Mr. DeCosmos is in England, and has placed the grievances of British Columbia before members of the House of Commons. Lord Geo. Hamilton gave notice of his intention to ask the Under Secretary for the Colonies whether the attention of his office had been directed to the constant complaints of the inhabitants of British Columbia, that although it is ten years since they were incorporated with the Dominion, the main condition which induced them to assent to that incorporation, the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway system, had, in spite of frequent protests, not been commenced upon that seaboard &c.

Mr. Vennor's predictions for July are, that it will give a great deal of rain over a large portion of the United States and Canada, while in Great Britain the weather will in all probability be likewise stormy and wet. The storms of wind, thunder and lightning are likely to be heavy and frequent between the 10th and 15th. An exceedingly hot term is likely to be experienced in both the United States and Canada within a few days from the close of the month. Prohably about the 27th or 28th a cool wave will occur, carrying frosts in Canada and cool weather generally, with storms of wind and rain throughout the United States.

ENGLAND.-The London Standard says the entire population of the Kingdom will be shown by the coming census to be above thirty five million, an increase in the decade of a little over four millions.

FRANCE .- A cylone in the district of Blois, caused damage to the extent of several million francs.
