A discussion ensued. Mr. Biggar, having been several times called to order for irrelevancy in his remarks, was finally requested by the Speaker to leave the House, and he withdrew to the stranger's gallery.

Several motions to adjourn were offered. Mr. Gladstone declared that if the debate had proceeded without obstruction the Government would have consented to adjournment, but the Home Rulers having thrown down a challenge the Government, advised the House to continue the debate until it was concluded.

Placards have been posted in Londonderry and Ballina districts urging the people not to revolt, as the time has not yet come. The police have torn down the placards, and the Londonderry Land League denounce them as a fraud.

Judge Fitzgerald in his charge to the jury in Dublin repudiated both the theory of the defence that the Land League was chiefly a charitable association, and aga. the contrary theory that it was a scheme of socialism devised in America. The Americans, he said, were, as a nation, noble and generous, and no scheme of socialism for the destruction of property in Ireland had been devised by them.

The jury was discharged at 7.45, the foreman stating that it was impossible for them to agree. They were ten to twe, but the Judge said he could only receive a unanimous verdict. Great excitement prevailed, and it heightened when the judge said that after the exhibition of to-day in the Court, he could not expect there would be a free and unanimous verdict. Immense crowds were cheering outside the Court House. Mr. Parnell remained in the Court all day. He was loudly cheered on going to and returning from luncheon.

South Africa. - A despatch from Durban gives the following account of the engagement with the Boers: Gen. Col. ley's advance guard, consisting of a portion of the 58th regiment and a force of horsemen, attacked the Boer's position. The attack at the first was partially successful, but subsequently the Boers were strongly reinforced and repulsed the British troops with heavy loss. The Boers suffered severely. Both sides maintain their position.

The troop ship Euphrates has arrived from Bombay with reinforcements of artillery, cavalry and foot, 1,813 strong. The Basutos are reported in want of food and are tired of fighting.


