

The *Globe's* correspondent reports the opening in Exeter Hall, London, of the World's Conference of Y. M. C. A., July 30. It will be remembered that Exeter Hall became the property of the London Young Men's Christ. Association by the munificent donation of six London merchants at a cost of \$124,000. A further sum of \$100,000 was soon afterwards subscribed to adapt the premises to the requirements of the Association and to improve the buildings. The only condition in the gift by the donors was that at the May meetings would be reserved the right of the use of the building. This Convention was presided over by George Williams, the well-known founder of Young Men's Christian Associations. Canada was represented by eight delegates and the United States by seventy-five delegates, prominent among whom are Rev. A. A. Compton, Ottawa; Messrs. D. A. Budge and Wm. Scott, of Montreal; F. S. Cole, of Quebec; Mr. John Wanamaker, of Philadelphia; Rev. Dr. Cuyler, of Brooklyn; Miss R. R. McMurey, R. C. Morse and Hon. W. E. Dodge, of New York.

NEWFOUNDLAND'S FIRST RAILWAY.—The New York and Newfoundland Railway Company formally commenced the work of Railway construction in this island to-day. Shortly before noon the first sod was turned, under the management of Mr. Bolland, an engineer of European reputation, and several squads of navies are now busily engaged in grading those sections of the road that had been previously located. The two termini of the Railway are St. John's on the South and the North shore of Notre Dame Bay on the Northern end. Concurrently with the inauguration of the Railway work in St. John's there is reported from undoubted sources a gold find of extraordinary promise at Mings Bight, close to the very spot where the New York company, at least for the present proposes terminating their lines. The vein ranges from ten and a half to twelve inches in breadth on the surface and widens considerably as it descends. It has been found by the assayer to yield eighteen ounces of pure gold to the ton of ore, so far as explorers have ascertained, the vein preserves an unbroken continuity for several miles. The proposed 400 miles of railway, now actually begun, runs through the whole of the principal metalliferous belts of the island, and capitalists of New York have secured this golden contract with the Newfoundland Government.


