#### KINGS COLLEGE.

I now send you the revised figures. Membership when I came to Charlottetown, December, 1875, 64; Number added since then till the time the Missionary was published, 209; membership at that time, 210; present membership, 223.

During the revival that the church enat the least, one of the present efficient joyed, while Bro. Haynes and I labored together, previously to his departure, the number added was eighteen in all and not thirty.six; and the membership of the church when Bro. Haynes left was eighty and not ninety eight.

I hope to have something of greater interest to your readers to communicate in my next.

I have compared the above figures with the church records, and find them to be correct in ever particular.
