TURKEY.—Earthquake shocks of considerable violence have begun again in Chio. It is estimated that barely twenty houses remain habitable on the whole Island. Forty-five villages have been totally destroyed, and population in many localities have entirely disappear.

Russia.-Naru Kissar the most advanced fort on the road to Merv, has been taken by suprise and captured by Turcomans. The entire Russian garrison was killed.

Nicholas Sudzellafsky, and important Nhilist, was recently arrrested at Jassy by the Roumanian authorities. He was implicated in the peasant disorders at Ichigrin, but escaped. The Russian Government has taken steps for his ex. dradition by Roumanian.

All the Nhilists except the woman Hessy Helfmann, condemned to death for connection with the Czar's assassination, namely, Russakoff, Michaeloff's, Kilbalschitish, Jeliaboff, and Sophie Rieolasky, were hanged at 10 o'clock on Friday morning. Michaelkoff's rope broke twice. Order was not disturbed. there was an immense concourse of spectators.

The condemned Nihilists were escorted from the fortress to the place of execution by Cossacks and infantry with drums and fife. Detachments of all the regiments of guards stationed in St. Petersburg surrounded the scaffold.

Spain.—A profound sensation has been caused at Madrid by a telegram from the Gov. ITALY. - Depretis is negotiating for the formation of a Cabinet, but the King refrains from intrusting the task formally to anybody until he can receive reasonable assurance that a Ministry able to command a majority can be obtained.

Mexico. - Governor Terassay, of Chihuahua has stationed 500 Mexican troops at El Paso, anticipating trouble between the natives and Americans when the railroads get further into the interior of Mexico.


