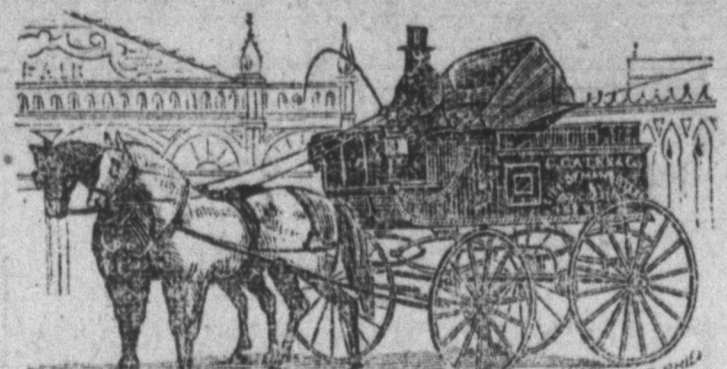
TEA MEETING AT Indian Harbour, St. Margarets Bay, On Tuesday, Oct. 4th, at 2 P.M.

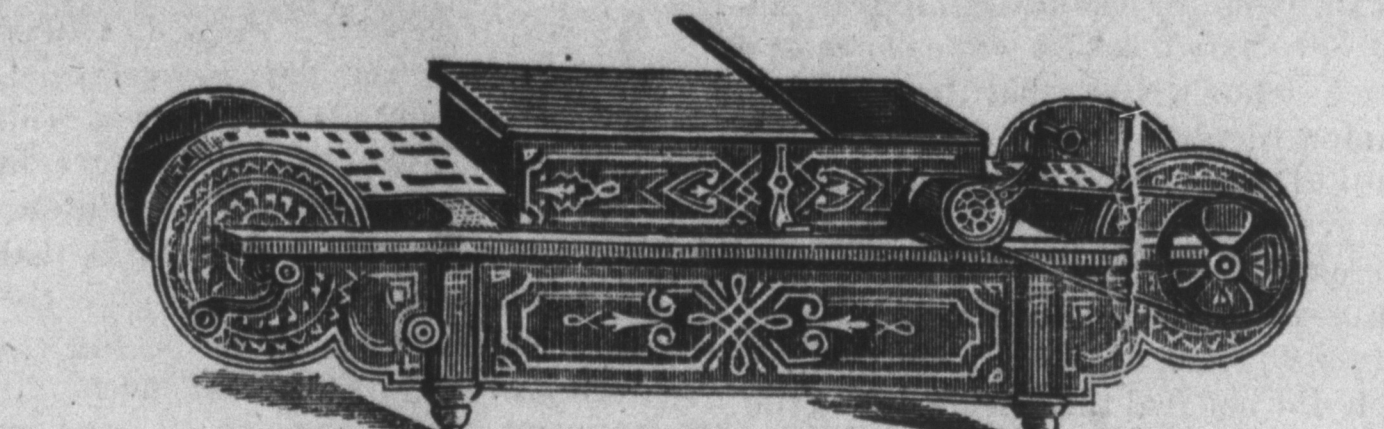
