But in winter, it is advisable to set a small sponge in the afternoon-about four o'clock-in this way: A scant pint of flout is mixed with a pint and a half of warm water. To this, add a cake of yeast, previously soaked in little warm water (taking care not to gether. By seven o'clock, this, if kept covered in a warm place near the stove will be very light. Now, set your bread-sponge as usual, using the smaller


