DOMINION & FOREIGN NEWS.

DONINION OF CANADA.-The House of Commons has been engaged with the budget, and changes in the tariff during the past week, and closed on Friday. The Ontario and Pacific Junction Rail-

way Company have petitioned for leave to amend their Incorporation bill so as to give power to build to Sault Ste. Marie, bridge Ste. Marie River, and connect with American railways there, carrying out Mr. Blake's plan.

Senator Vidal, at the suggestion of the Dominion Alliance, has introduced a bill in the Senate in amendment of the Canada Temperance Act as relates to Nova Scotia, to faciliate bringing it into operation in counties where no licenses are issued.
