There have been ten or twelve telegraphic cables laid across the Atlantic Ocean. A new one is now being laid by the steamer Faraday. On Thursday last she left Dover Cove, seven miles from Canso. The cable is to be laid in a trench that has been dug between Canso and the shore. The Faraday after laying the shore end of the cable, left at 6 o'clock on that day, and steamed away out to sea to join with the end buoyed about five hundred miles away.







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1. A garment in calico, print, or long cloth, showing all the stitches required in gathering, stroking, setting-in, marking, button-hole, sewing on button. Garment, a plain night shirt, night gown, petticoat, or child's frock, either in calico, coloured shirting, or print.

2. Darning plain (as for thin places), in stocking web material and woven fabric.

3. Knitting, 4 needles, a man's stocking or girl's stocking.

4. Herring-bone, a patch (at least. inches square) on coarse flannel, or other plain-woven woollen material.

Those of the second year are required to shew :---

1. A garment in long cloth or mull muslin, showing all the stitches required in Standard V.

2. Gratting and Swiss darning on stocking material, and ladder properly taken up.

3. A patch, not less than 21 inches square, in old flannel, serge or woollen, or on a garment of one of these materials.

4. A boy's knickerbocker stocking, The third year must shew in addition :--

stitch, on stocking material, not less than 11 inches square.

A pair of knitted baby's boots.

Pattern of a shirt or night dress (full size) drawn to scale  $(\frac{1}{4} \text{ size})$  on sectional paper; quantity and quality of materials to be stated.

The fourth year teachers :---

1. To show three garments, suited to the class of which the pupil teacher has charge, cut out and neatly " fixed or tacked " together.

2. A three-cornered (or hedge-tear) darn, the tear not less than 1 inch square, and a cross-cut darn, on old calico, flannel, or table-linen.

3, A roll or piece of sectional paper (1 inch scale) representing a piece of calico or holland, 32 inches wide by three yards long, on which patterns of garments, suitable for children attending public elementary schools, are drawn so arranged as to show the greatest econ omy of materials,

Thursday in a balloon, landed five miles south of Paris the next day.

There appears but little abatement in the floods in the United States. From St. Louis we learn that a yawl filled with negroes was caught in a whirlpool near Milliken's Bend, upset, and all the occupants were drowned. The whirlpool struck a church in which several people with their stock had taken refuge. The church was, in a few minutes, torn to pieces and carried away. The stock was drowned. The people floated around in the water for some hours, but were finally rescued.

At Yazoo City on Tuesday last the water was two feet above the 1867 mark. The water rose one inch in twelve hours. Boats from above report the water at a stand, and excitement subsiding. A large percentage of refugees are negroes.




