Home News.

Nova Scotia.

The Allan steamer Prussian arrived on Monday evening from Liverpool, G. B. During a thick fog last Wednesday afternoon, while sailing at the rate of eight knots a hour, she ran into a large iceberg and had her bowsprit and bow plates smashed and figurehead carried away.

A telegram on Monday says, THE MARQUIS OF LORNE is coming to Halifax next week, and will stay in the Lower Provinces till the arrival of the Princess Louise, and will not return to Ottawa for six months.

The greatest interest has been felt in the fortunes or rather misfortunes of the Allen steamer Peruvian, during the past week, which has been drifting about in the ice fields of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, with the loss of her propeller, much of the time within sight of North Cape, and of other steamships unable to reach her with help. The fact of her having on board near a thousand passengers, and a crew of more than a hundred has made her condition a matter of the deepest interest.

Another sad item in connection therewith has been the burning of the steamer Progress on her way to the relief of the Peruvian, with a supply of provisions and coal. It appears that the fire commenced in the lamp room of the Progress. The crew were taken off by the tug Resolute, not however without much danger and injury to several of them. Two seamen were burned in their beds. By telegram on Sunday we learned that the steamer Herman had taken the Peruvian's mails on Friday. The passengers and crew were all well, and she was getting on well under sail for Rimouski. She arrived on Monday in tow of the steamer Acadia.

The Nova Scotia Steamship Company at Yarmouth propose running steamers between that port and St. John New Brunswick, calling at Grand Manan, Eastport, and Westport.

Kings County has exported large quantities of potatoes lately at good prices.

Amherst is shortly to have a glass factory for the manufacture of pressed goods. The locality has many facilities for this industry, plenty of coal, straw, lumber. There is no reason why we should have to depend on importation for our glass goods.

The Oxford Woollen mills are unable to supply the demand and they are being enlarged.

"The Month's Mind" has been much before the public in the morning papers in connection with reports of the Roman Catholic services on behalf of the late Archbishop Hannan. It is customary for high masses to be celebrated "for the repose of the soul" of some celebrated person one month after their death. There appears to have been a large gathering of church dignitaries on the occasion on Tuesday last. High eulogiums were passed upon the departed Archbishop.

In Guysboro' County there is much suffering for want of hay for the cattle. Many lambs are left to die in the fields and roadside as soon as they are born.

In Pictou County, a cow lately gave birth to a monstrosity in the form of a double-headed calf, the heads being nearly at right angles on the neck. After this the cow, with the offspring, died.

It is an unnatural thing for a calf or anything else to have two heads! Such a thing is very likely to die.

Manitoba Lots have been in demand. Mr. Shand sold 175 the other day realizing \$3,324 and another lot the next day.

The P. E. Island steamers have commenced their regular trips between Pictou and Charlottetown.

Forty P. E. Islanders arrived at Moncton Wednesday evening, en route to the North-West.

A son of Mr. John Hess, of Bear River, while playing in the branches of a tree overhanging the river, on Sunday last, lost his grasp, and fell into the water and was drowned.

Mr. Ralph S. Eaton, having resigned his position as second Master of Morris Street school, after some years of satisfactory service, was presented by his fellow teachers and pupils in the school with a handsome writing desk. The present was accompanied by a most complimentary address, to which Mr. Eaton made an appropriate reply.

New Brunswick.

The following new Legislative Councilors have been appointed: Mr. A. F. Randolph, Fredericton; A. D. Richard, Dorchester; Messrs. Beveridge, Davidson, Hill, and Woods, former M. P.'s.

The Local Government has been reconstituted as follows:—Mr. D. L. Hamington, Premier, without office; E. McLeod, who is a candidate for election in St. John, becomes Attorney-General; Mr. Landry, Provincial Secretary; Mr. Colter a York County member, takes the Board of Works. The personnel otherwise is the same.

Sussex has sent 40,000 bushels of potatoes to the United States during the past Winter and Spring realizing a return of \$25,000.

The Volunteer Camp to be held at Sussex this year will comprise about 1,500 men and will assemble about the end of June.

The New Brunswick Merino Manufacturing Company" has been organized in St. John, with a capital of \$50,000. Operations are to be commenced immediately. The manufacture of wool, yarns, shirts, drawers and cardigan jackets, will be made a specialty.

The New Brunswick Granite Company are shipping large quantities of their goods to the Upper Provinces.

W. J. Smart, Superintendent of the Hibbard Antimony Company, was last week on his way to Nova Scotia to hire an additional force of miners. Eighty men are now employed there, and the output is from thirty to forty tons a day, worth from \$75 to \$90 per ton. The main shaft is 250 feet deep, and the Company have 800 feet of levels. The mine is paying handsomely.

Dominion of Canada.

In the House of Commons on Tuesday last, Sir C. Tupper moved the House into committee on the resolutions to grant aid towards the construction of certain railways in Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, as set forth in the resolution of the previous day. They were passed through committee.

Sir John introduced a bill giving an annual grant of \$150,000 to aid in the development of the sea fisheries. The bill was read a second and third time and passed.

The debate on the resolutions to grant subsidies towards the construction of certain railways in railways in Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia closed. The resolutions passed. After the bill for the re-adjustment of the representation in Parliament had been fully discussed, and the amendments made in the Senate concurred in, Sir John A. Macdonald announced that owing to the forward state of the business of the Session, the Governor General would come down and close the Session on the following day.

On Wednesday after a short time spent in routine business, His Excellency came and with the usual formalities gave the Royal assent to the Bills passed. He then prorogued parliament by the following

CLOSING SPEECH:

Hon. Gentlemen of the Senate: Gentlemen of the House of Commons: I desire to convey to you my best thanks for the earnestness and assiduity which you have shown in the perform-

ance of your Parliamentary duties, and I am glad to believe that on returning to your homes you will find the country everywhere enjoying a large measure of prosperity.

The Civil Service Act will, I trust, be productive of the best results. It will improve the organization and add to the usefulness of that service, already so efficient.

The measures relating to the extradition of fugitive offenders; to the winding up of insolvent banks, insurance companies and trading corporations, and for amending the criminal law are all of an important nature.

The appropriation in aid of railway enterprise will tend greatly to open up vast tracts of fertile country hitherto almost inaccessible to the settler.

The annual grant for the encouragement of sea fishermen will be of great value to that important branch of the national industries.

The removal of the duties on tea and coffee will lessen the cost of those important articles of food to the people, and the repeal of the stamp tax on bills of exchange and promissory notes will be appreciated by the commercial community as a relief from an irksome burden; while the transmission of newspapers and periodicals free from postage will be accepted as a boon by the whole country.

Our manufactures, already in a prosperous condition, will be further aided by the abolition of the duties on metals and other raw materials used in their several productions.

It is satisfactory to know that the buoyant state of the revenue will permit these reductions, amounting to about a million and a quarter of dollars, to be made without inconvenience.

During the recess my Ministers will continue their efforts to secure favorable commercial arrangements with France and Spain. In these endeavors the High Commissioner will receive the same hearty support from Her Majesty's Government and the Imperial diplomacy as has already been given to him. Such support must greatly strengthen Canada in any negotiations entered into for the improvement of her trade with foreign countries. It has been the more readily accorded that Her Majesty's Government rely on no preference being given by Canada against the trade or products of the mother country.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons: I thank you, in Her Majesty's name, for the supplies you have granted, which will be expended with all due attention to economy.

Hon. Gentlemen of the Senate: Gentlemen of the House of Commons: I heartily congratulate you on the rapid and successful development of our manufacturing, agricultural and other industries. I am, however, advised that their progress would have been still greater were it not that capitalists hesitate to embark their means in undertakings which would be injured if not destroyed, by a change in the trade and fiscal policy adopted by you in 1879. In order, therefore, to give the people, without further delay, an opportunity of expressing their deliberate opinion on this policy, and, at the same time, to bring into operation the measure for the readjustment of the representation in the House of Commons, it is my intention to cause this Parliament to be dissolved at an early day.

Writs have been issued and forwarded to the several counties of the Dominion for the election of members to the House of Commons. They are returnable on the 7th of August. The elections will be some time previous to that date, probably about the middle of June.

The usual hilarity before the rising of the House of Commons seems to have been indulged in by some of the members with it is said, the addition of fire-crackers.
