Thursday destroyed a large number of buildings. The portion of the town destroyed comprises almost the entire business part of the place. The three principal hotels were burned, and the office of the Daily Nugget destroyed. The Daily Epitaph office was heavily damaged. The Western Union Telegraph Office was also destroyed. The loss is probably half a million, the insurance a quarter million.

The Grant Company's smelting works, at Leadville, were burned on Friday. Loss from three to four hundred thousand dollars. These works are the largest of the kind in the world. Over 300 men are thrown out of work here and quite a number at the Omaha Refinery works, where this company was located.

At a meeting of iron manufacturers, held on Wednesday last, it was unanimously decided to resist all demands of amalgamated associations for increased wages. The 50,000 workmen in the Western Iron Mills will therefore strike on June 1st.

An explosion occurred in the Heckscherville colliery. Six miners have been taken out dead, and a number of others severely injured.

At Delton, Texas, early Sunday morning a hundred masked men visited the jail and took Sam Hiltou (white) and James Keyes (colored) and hanged them from a tree. Both were charged with a murderous assault on a deputy.
