It is expected that the Marquis of Lorne will sail to-day from Liverpool for Canada.

It was rumored a few days since that an attempt was being made to abstract the bodies of the Prince Imperial and Napoleon III. from the vaults at Chislehurst.

Earl Derby has made a new departure. At the banquet of the Liverpool Club he said he hoped there would be no further attempt to prevent Bradlaugh taking the Parliamentary oath.

A violent gale, accompanied by rain, prevailed on Friday last throughout the United Kingdom.

The President, Secretary, and Treasurer of the Ladies' Land League at Roscommon, Ireland, were arrested one day last week.

At a meeting of the Emmistown commission a letter from Herbert Gladstone was read, stating that according to official information crime is decreasing in proclaimed districts.

Earl Cowper, Lord-Lieut. of Ireland, has refused the request of the Dublin corporation to grant permission to Parnell and Dillon to attend at the City Hall to receive certificates of the freedom of the city.

The French Government has repudiated the action of its subordinates in annexing the island of Kiootea in the South Pacific.

The Archbishop of Rouen has been to Rome and back, and now he urges Italians to choose another capital, and leave Rome to the Pope.

Alarms in Northern Africa are causing some apprehension. The Times' Suda despatch says the intention of the French to permanently occupy the city becomes more apparent.

The Times says: "The people of England would view with serious apprehension any further interference in the internal affairs of Egypt."

A disturbance occurred in Paris on Sunday last. While a procession composed of 300 persons were proceeding to Pere Lachaise cemetery.

The Berlin papers cautiously discuss the Imperial rescript, which is regarded as fulfilling the threat of an impending conflict.
