At Annapolis, St. John, N.B., and Portland Maine, 3 hours and 25 minutes LATER, and at St. John's Newfoundland, 30 minutes EARLIER, than at Halifax. At Charlottetown, 2 hours 56 minutes LATER. A Yarmouth, 2 hours 54 minutes LATER. For THE LENGTH OF THE DAY.—Add 12 hours to the time of the sun's setting, and from the sun subtract the time of rising. FOR THE LENGTH OF THE NIGHT.—Subtract the time of the sun's setting, from 12 hours and to the remainder add the time of rising next morning.
