Still he remained faithful to his convictions of New Testament truth; and never swerved from the position occupied by Baptists. His life was consistent with the doctrines he held. At Vienna, Austria, on the 11th, frosty weather continued, snow and hail were damaging vegetation. Egypt is taking a bold stand. The Paris Temps publishes a letter from Cairo which says that war is openly declared against all Europeuns engaged in official functions in Egypt. The Arab papers advocate the absolute expulsion of Europeans from the public service.

At Cairo, Arabi Bey is freely accused of cowardice. It is believed that prisoners are being tortured. Arabi has intimated his intention of having some of the prisoners shot.

Emigration from Europe to the United States, has commenced in good earnest, On Tuesday of last week three thousand immigrants arrived, including one thousand three hundred Italians.




