News of the World.

In the House of Commons on Thursday last, Mr. Gladstone eloquently defended the Irish policy of the Government. Referring to his recent utterances respecting Home Rule, Mr. Gladstone declared he had simply repeated, regarding local government for Ireland, what he had often said—the supremacy of the British Parliament must be maintaiced; the country cannot give Ireland what it cannot give Scotland.

The cotton spinners of North and North-east Lancashire have withdrawn their demand for an increase of wages. An explosion occurred in a colliery at Trindon Grange, Durham, on Friday, by which 120 persons were entombed the mine. Thirty of the imprisoned in workmen have been rescued. The foul gas resulting from the explosion caused the death of four persons in another colliery two miles distant.

The Admirality has informed the Royal Geographical Society that the Government cannot fit out an expedition to search for Leigh Smith, but will contribute \$50,000 towards meeting the expenses of a private expedition, provided that the necessary extra funds shall be forthcoming, and the arrangements meet with the approval of the Admiralty.

In the House of Commons on Friday evening the report on the address was adopted by a vote of 129 to 14.

Miss Mclean then told the boy to try and save himself. He was unwilling to leave her, and attempted to take her to a house, but failed. He himself started with a horse, but did not go far before the horse was unable to proceed. He then crawled on his hands and kneeshis feet being frozen to the ankles-to Mr Lane's barn. He was taken care of by Mr. Lane's family, and the neighbours went in search of those he left on the
