D., of Harvard; Professor Joseph Leconte, of the University of California; Professor Jas. D. Dana, LL. D., of Yale.

Dr. Moss concludes by saying: "Finally, Christianity has nothing to fear from the progress of physical science, nor from any form of knowledge and culture. The Church has but two enemies in this country which she need fear, and therefore but two dangers—IGNORANCE and IMMORALITY."

News of the World.

There has been a change of government in France. Gambetta's ministry has been defeated and will be replaced by M. Leon Say Minister of Finance; M. Varray, Minister of Public Works; General Billot, Minister of War; and Admiral Jouriquiberry, Minister of Marine. This has been the prominent subject in European politics of the past week.

Proposals have been made to the British Ambassador in Paris for further reductions of duties on cotton and woollen fabrics. They are not regarded as satisfactory.

The United Ireland henceforth will be published at Paris instead of London. Summaries in French relating to the land movement will be issued.





HALIFAX AND CAPE BRETON RAILWAY.


