There has been a change of government in France. Gambetta's ministry has been defeated and will be replaced by M. Leon Say Minister of Finance; M. Varray, Minister of Public Works; General Billot, Minister of War; and Admiral Jouriquiberry, Minister of Marine.

Proposals have been made to the British Ambassador in Paris for further reductions of duties on cotton and woollen fabrics. They are not regarded as satisfactory.

The United Ireland henceforth will be published at Paris instead of London. Summaries in French relating to the land movement will be issued.

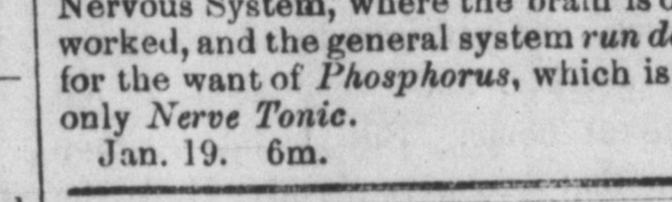

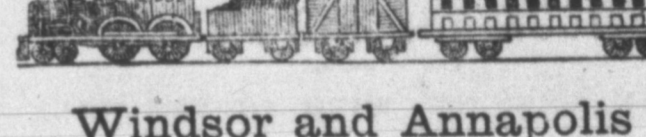

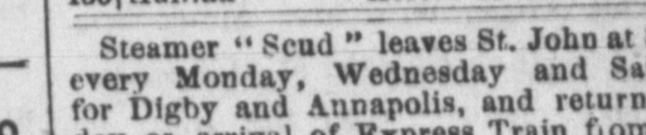
