Rev. S. T. Clanton (colored) spoke of "The Moral and Intellectual Awakening Among the Freedmen of the South." The causes of this awakening, said the speaker, are the Book of God and the Christian School.

Rev. James Lisk, D. D., of New York made an interesting address on "The Sunday School as an Agency for the Reaching and Uplifting of the Masses of the Freed People."

The Woodstock Town Council has accepted the tender of Messrs. Burrell, Johnson & Co., of Yarmouth, to construct waterworks for \$52,900.

Farmers in Albert County, find potato bugs crawling round lively when they plough up the ground for Spring planting.

The Anniversary exercises at Mount Allison College and Academies at Sackville were being held last week. The College convocation will take place this Wednesday, June 6th, at 10 a. m., when orations will be delivered, degrees conferred, etc.

Dominion of Canada.

There has been a falling off in exports from the Dominion during April, as compared with the corresponding month last year, the decline being over 32 per cent. in total value. Of imports there was an increase, the value of dutiable goods being 15 per cent. of what they amounted to in April, 1882.

A letter to the Wesleyan says the Protestant denominations are well represented in Winnipeg. Methodism stands well in the city. There are four Methodist congregations here. The new Grace church, when completed, is to seat 1700 persons and is to cost \$60,000.

Winnipeg is going a-head rapidly. In 1870 the population was about 300. It is now said to be 25,000. As one stands on Main Street and looks at the beautiful buildings and fine stores it seems difficult to realize that this spot a few years ago was nothing more than wild prairie land. New buildings are being erected on every hand. For the last fortnight the average number of immigrants arriving has been about 400 per day. Most of these pass through to points farther West. Quite a number of these new arrivals bring a good share of the wealth and energy of the old land with them.

The site of a city on the Saskatchewan, to be called "Leopold," was fixed on a recent visit of General Manager Vanhorne. The site occupies a beautiful location on the East bank of the Saskatchewan, on a plateau forty feet higher. Graders are scattered West of the river for a distance of a hundred and twenty miles towards Calgary. Five thousand men are employed on the construction works.

A few weeks ago the friends of the Hon. Alexander MacKenzie made him a large gift: now an Ottawa despatch announces that Sir Hector Langevin's friends and political admirers have made him a handsome present of \$30,000. Such political donations visits amount to something.

The Princess Louise on Sunday attended service in St. Andrew's church, Ottawa. It is said to be the first time in Canada that she has attended a non-Episcopal service. Rev. Principal Grant, of Queen's University, officiated.

Among the pictures at the annual exhibition of the Royal Academy last week in Toronto were several exquisite sketches in water colors by the Princess Louise, made during her recent trip to Bermuda and the Southern States.

At a meeting of McGill University graduates on Monday evening, a resolution favoring the admission of women to the classes was carried, with but one dissenting vote.
