B., and Portland Maine, 3 hours and 25 minutes LATER, at St. John's, Newfoundland, 20 minutes EARLIER, than at Halifax. At Charlottetown, 2 hours 55 minutes LATER. A Westport, 2 hours 55 minutes LATER. A Yarmouth, 2 hours 20 minutes LATER.

FOR THE LENGTH OF THE DAY.—Add 12 hours to the time of the sun's setting, and from the sun subtract the time of rising. FOR THE LENGTH OF THE SUN'S SETTING.—Subtract the time of the sun's setting, from 12 hours and to the remainder add the time of rising next morning.
