> It is affirmed that the Dominion Parliament will not close till early in June. The Minister of Militia informed a deputation on Wednesday, that the House would be in session on the 24th of May, when a military review would take place.

On Friday last Sir John Macdonald introduced a bill respecting the electorial franchise, the object of which was to enlarge the franchise and it was proposed to assimilate the franchises of the vari ous Provinces, so that the same classes in each Province would have the same franchise. The voters in cities, towns and incorporated villages to have the same qualification. The British subject 21 years of age in the cities, towns and villages should have a vote if he was owner of real property to the value of \$300. Residents of cities and towns having an income of \$400, and who have been resident for a year, should also have a vote. In the counties the rental of real property of the value of \$200, or a tenant under a lease of not less than one year paying a rental of \$20, should also be entitled to a vote.

Farmers' sons, who were not otherwise qualified as voters, should have a right to vote if their father's farm was of sufficient value to qualify them all as voters under this Act.
