Nova Scotia.

Matthew H. Richey, Esq., was sworn in as Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Nova Scotia on Wednesday last. Governor Archibald presided on the occasion. The oaths were administered by Sir William Young. After signing the roll the new Governor received the hearty congratulations of a large number of gentlemen present. Mr. Archibald retired from Government House on Wednesday. Some necessary repairs will be made before Mr. Richey removes into it. He, Mr. R. will reside in Windsor part of the summer, and come to town when required by his official duties.

Mr. Donald Archibald, the new High Sheriff of Halifax, has arrived from the North West and will enter upon his duties at an early day.

The Chronicle says we understand that the writ for the election for the House of Commons, caused by the appointment of Mr. M. H. Richey, M. P., to the Lieutenant Governorship, will be issued at once, and that Tuesday, July 24th, will be nomination day.

Alderman David McPherson has been appointed to the vacant seat on the Board of Public Charities.

The coffee-steam used in repairing the steamer City of Chester a few weeks since is doing the work of a dry dock. It was placed under the stern of the steamer City of Newcastle on Friday, and the water was pumped out by the steam-tug Goliath.

The entertainments which are being given in the country and at St. John, N. B., by Mr. Fraser and the pupils of the Halifax School for the Blind are highly spoken of by the local and St. John press. The School is deserving of the warmest sympathy and encouragement.

The Baptists of Portauquique, Colchester Co., are erecting a new church edifice.

The new Presbyterian church at Great Village is advancing rapidly. Messrs. Rhodes & Curry, of Amherst, are the contractors, and Mr. Dumeresq, of St. John, architect.

The Truro Sun says that J. M. Blaikie, of Great Village, has laid the keel of the second largest vessel ever built in this Province, the length of keel being 230 feet.

Advocate is fast becoming a deal shipping port of some magnitude. Last week there were seven square-rigged vessels in the harbor loading with deals for Europe.

The Spencer's Island Co. are shortly to launch a ship of 1,800 tons for the East India trade, to be commanded by Capt. J. Spicer.

We were visited last week by two or three sharp storms of thunder and lightning.

The lightning on Thursday last seems to have done some mischief. At Grand Lake Station the rails were torn up and the sleepers splintered in hundreds of pieces.

The holidays at the Public Schools of the City commenced yesterday and will continue to August 22nd.

At a recent meeting of the School Board, Commissioner Ackburn reported that there was ample accommodation in Tower Road and Beech Street Schools for all the children attending Coburg Road School and the purchase of the latter building was deemed unnecessary, and its lessors to be notified that the lease will terminate three months from the date of such notice, the pupils will be removed to Tower Road and Beech Street Schools.

The result of the examinations on June 29th and 30th for admission to the High School, was that 21 for scholarships passed, and two will be allowed to enter as paying scholars, and of those for admission as paying pupils twelve were successful.

The Annapolis Spectator says:—We fear that the apple crop this year will be light. We hear reports on all hands that the trees blossomed very well but the fruit has not formed. Some people attribute the failure to grubs while others say it is caused by late frosts.

Mr. J. W. Margeson, of Cornwallis, has a pair of fat cattle, fatted last winter, which weighed on the scales last Wednesday, 4,420 lbs. It is thought that this is the heaviest yoke of cattle in Nova Scotia.—Monitor.

On Thursday last Mr. Kenneth Ballie, of Earlton, was gored by a savage bull, causing death.

The County Academy of Cumberland has been closed in consequence of diphtheria.

The poll tax of \$2 was ordered to be levied and collected as usual.

THE MILITIA CAMP assembled at Pictou for drill on Tuesday last. Rations were served on Wednesday morning to 1,247 men, not including officers. The number in each battalion being as follows:

The Argyle Highlanders are on an average much the largest men, but are not very neat in appearance. The Annapolis band is much praised for the quality of its music.

The Y. M. C. A. of Pictou erected a large tent on the grounds, furnished with reading matter, and where services were held.

Some of the men have been getting a little unruly of late, and when under the influence of liquor have been creating disturbances, but the majority conduct themselves well.

At Grand Lake a horse belonging to Mr. Nichols was struck by the train, and almost instantly killed, owing to the fences near the station having been razed to the ground, which permitted the animal to escape from the field.

The Annual Report of the Home for the Aged shows the society to be doing a good work. The institution is a great blessing to those who in advanced years are without any other comfortable home.

Albert county has been busy the past week with the election. The candidates were the same as in the last election; the vote was to be taken yesterday.

The Dominion Exhibition at St. John will receive quite a number of exhibits of stock and manufactures from this province.

The enterprising firm of I. Matheson & Co., New Glasgow, has offered to supply, free of charge, the steam boilers required to run the machinery of the St. John exhibition and the offer has been accepted.

Dominion of Canada.

The Montreal Customs Receipts for the quarter ending 30th June last were \$1,869,893, a decrease of \$125,565 as compared with the same period in 1882. The receipts for the twelve months ending the same date show an increase of \$81,594 over the previous year.

A serious collision of freight trains occurred Friday morning on the Grand Trunk near Port Hope. The damage is estimated at \$200,000.

The Manitoba legislature has carried a resolution in favor of the ballot system of voting.

The Indian headquarters were removed from Winnipeg to Regina on Friday last, and there will only be an Indian superintendent for Manitoba hereafter. In Winnipeg treaty payment for the Province and adjoining territories has begun, and Indians in consequence are jubilant.

In the Manitoba Legislature Mr. Norquay in his budget estimates the revenues at \$560,729, and expenditures \$504,400.

THE FOURTH ANNUAL MEETING of the PROVINCIAL EDUCATIONAL ASSOCIATION will be held in FREEMANSON'S HALL (corner of Granville and Salter streets), Halifax, on the 11th and 12th of JULY—first Session at 10 A. M. on the 11th.

The programme embraces, besides the Opening Address of the Superintendent of Education, the following papers: The Certification of Teachers, by Prof. H. F. Eaton, of the Provincial Normal School; Science in Schools, by Prof. Caldwell, of Acadia College; the Kindergarten System, by Miss Jessie S. Campbell (Halifax); A Proposed Method of High School Examinations, by E. J. Lay, Principal of Amherst Academy.

Ample opportunity will be afforded for discussing the subjects of the above papers as well as for considering the course of study for High schools to be submitted. Shorter papers on practical subjects will be furnished by several gentlemen. These will include Penmanship by Inspector W. D. McKenzie; Navigation as a Practical Art by Mr. E. H. Owen, (Lunenburg Academy); by Principal Calkin, of the Normal School. The exercises will be varied with suitable illustrative lessons by various teachers.

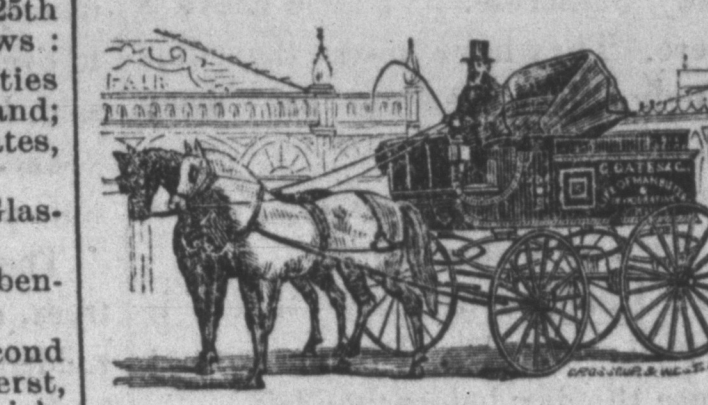
