

The Poplar Grove Vestry was the scene of a festive occasion on Thursday last, consisting of a tea, readings, songs, recitations, &c., by ladies and gentlemen of first class ability in each department.

The Eighth Annual Meeting of the Infants' Home was held last week and was attended by clergymen of all denominations. The report stated that during the past year there were 50 babies admitted; 13 died, 13 were adopted, and, at the close of the year, 45 were in the Home. Last year, at the same time, the number was 34. Since the Home was opened, eight years ago, 396 babies have shared its benefits. Of these 87 have been adopted. Many were in the Home temporarily, and were removed in due time by parents or guardians. Receipts during 1882, for current expenses, amounted to \$2,780.41. Of this amount \$400 was received from the Provincial Government; \$300 from the City Council; \$417.70 from churches as thank offerings; \$65 from the Regatta Committee, and \$269 for board. The balance is made up of donations and subscriptions. Ordinary expenditure amounted to \$2,722.87. The expense would be very materially larger were it not for numerous donations of furniture, clothing and articles of food received from kind friends.

The Institution is managed by a large Committee of ladies, and the following Advisory Committee of gentlemen:— Wm. Akhurst, J. S. Farguhar, W. C. Silver, R. I. Hart, James C. Mackintosh, W. H. Harrington, John Burton, Rev. E. M. Saunders, D. D., Robt. Murray.

Dominion of Canada.

The Dominion Parliament will assemble to-morrow. It is said that Mr. Chas. Tupper, member elect for Pictou, N. S., and Son of Sir Chas. Tupper, will move an address in reply to the Speech from the Throne. The opening speech will be delivered on Friday, the previous day being occupied in swearing in members. The Governor-General's chair occupies a central position on the throne. The Speaker's chair is in its usual position.

The Government telegraph lines on the Atlantic coast and Gulf of St. Lawrence are to be transferred from the Department of Public Works to the Department of Marine.

A railway war has begun here between the Canada Pacific and Grand Trunk. The latter refuses to take freight from the former. The St. Lawrence and Ottawa has passed into the hands of the Grand Trunk and will be reopened for traffic on the old basis.

Great pressure is being brought to bear on the Government in support of the free canal movement. Ontario and Quebec are strongly urging the abolition of canal tolls, the Maritime provinces oppose it on the ground that while they will have to contribute largely to the cost of maintenance they will derive no corresponding benefit.

The contract for building a vessel to replace the Glendon was awarded to Daniel W. and Daniel C. Clark, of St. John, N. B. The vessel will be of wood, propelled by steam. Its work will be to make trips along the Eastern coast of Canada to the light-houses with supplies.

The nomination for the Ontario general elections will take place on the 20th inst., voting on the 27th. The writs were issued on Thursday last.

Postage on letters between India and Canada is now ten cents instead of fifteen cents.

People's Home Mission Agency.

The Society has been in operation 15 years. Colporteurs to the number of 102 have been employed, who have distributed Bibles and good books worth \$141,236 by sale, and books and tracts valued at \$10,051 by grant. Total grants by the Society, including those from Depot, more than \$16,000 worth. Time served by the Colporteurs equals that of one man for 142 years. Labrador, Newfoundland, Cape Breton, P. E. Island, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and a portion of Quebec have been explored. There have been found 1525 families without God's Word; 2,582 families with no other religious book; and 2,545 families who habitually neglect attending any place of worship.
