

People's Home Mission Agency. The Society has been in operation 15 years. Colporteurs to the number of 102 have been employed, who have distributed Bibles and good books worth \$141,236 by sale, and books and tracts valued at \$10,081 by grant. Total grants by the Society, including those from Depot, more than porteurs equals that of one man for 142 years. Labrador, Newfoundland, Cape Breton, P. E. Island, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and a portion of Quebec have been explored. There have been found 1,525 families without God's Word; 2,582 families with no other religious book ; and 2,545 families who habituall neglect attending any place of worship. The 26 Colporteurs employed in 1882 performed labor equal to that of one man for I21 years; found 205 Protestant families without Bibles, 279 with no other religious books, and 873 families who never enter the House of God. They sold books worth \$13,332; and made free grants to the value of \$913, as they made 31,679 family visits, and held 625 religious

meetings.
