The trial of those who have been arrested on charges of the dynamite conspiracy for the destruction of public building was opened on Thursday last at Bow Street, London. Their names are Norman, Dalton, Wilson, Dr. Gallagher, Bernard Gallagher, Curtin, Ansburg and Whitehead. It was announced that Norman had turned in-Thursday evening at 7.30. Rev. Joshua former, and the rest of the prisoners were formally charged with treason and felony.

Norman, on being called, testified that his real name was William Joseph Lynch, and that he was born of Irish parents in the State of New York.

Lynch swore that he worked in October in Brooklyn. At that time he joined a secret society in New York, the object of which was to free Ireland by force. The members went by numbers. The hall was situate corner of Second Street and the Bowery, where others associated in clubs. Managers of clubs were known as district members and were not known to each other by names. Members were selected to go ings of the scalp, promotes the renewed on missions. He (Lynch) was sent to Dr. Thomas Gallagher, who lived at Green Point, L. I. Gallagher told him he was to go to London. He would know what for when he got there. Gallagher paid his passage and \$100 besides, and told him to go to the American Exchange for a letter addressed to him. Gallagher gave him a small box. He examined it on the steamer, and finding it contained a spring which worked by pressure, became alarmed and threw it into the sea.

Lynch reached London on March 22nd. He met Gallagher in London on the 27th or 28th. They walked past the scene of the Westminster explosion. On his asking Gallagher if "that's what we are going to do," the latter answered "Yes." Gallagher viewed the Houses of Parliament and said. "They will make a great crash when they come down.'

At this point Gallagher shouted out from the dock, "You infamous liar."

Lynch deposed to further statements of Gallagher's as to what destruction was to be wrought. Lynch testified he went to Birmingham to see Whitehead at Gallagher's house for "some material." Whitehead put him in the way of getting India rubber bags. Lynch confirmed all the evidence submitted at the hearing last Thursday as to Gallagher having called for him as Fletcher. He said when Whitehead was putting the nitro-glycerine into the rubber bags he told Lynch that fifty pounds had been taken away that morning Whitehead also told him he would soon know what the liquid was. Whitehead here shouted, "You lie, you traitor." Lynch further testified Gallager met him when he returned to London from Birmingham with the nitro-glycerene. He had never seen any of the persons before except Gallaghar and Whitehead.

Lynch stated that the password for admission to the meetings in New York was " Providence." There were other associated clubs in New York such as Sarsfield 32nd St., the Owen Roe and the Thomas Davis, which met in Millikey Hall; the Emmet, on Eighth Sir Alexander T. Galt, addressing the Avenue, and the Davitt and Tom Moore clubs, of the meeting places of which he

was ignorant. Lynch fainted while his deposition was being read over, and had to be removed from the court room. The examination was adjourned until the following day.
